
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
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
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
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
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
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
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RUN Goes On-Line!



The New Commodore PC

With the announcement of its newest computer at the recent CES show in Las Vegas, Commodore has launched its first foray into the so-called personal computer market. The Commodore 128, with twice the memory of the popular C-64, promises more powerful and useful applications for the Commodore computerist.



ability to 512K and serious software available, this is a computer that could readily be used effectively in a business environment. Indeed, it offers so many excellent features that almost any computerist will find something to his liking about the C-128.

But perhaps the most attractive feature of the C-128 will be the price, which

At the show, consumer reaction to the C-128 was mixed. "I've got too much money tied up in my present system to change computers," noted one attendee wandering around the Commodore booth.

Others were more receptive to the new kid on the block and enthusiastically welcomed the C-128 when Commodore officials verified that it is compatible with the C-64 software programs. "Now I can give my C-64 to my son and buy the new computer for myself," said one excited parent.

3-in-1 Computer

With the introduction of the C-128, Commodore has unleashed its most versatile computer to date. It's almost like owning three computers in one.

First, there's the C-128 itself. Sporting the sleek design of an IBM PC, the C-128 features a full-sized keyboard with a numeric keypad, an enhanced Basic, a 40/80-column option, a built-in machine-language monitor and 128K that can be expanded to 512K with an external RAM disk option.

At the flick of a switch, you can turn your C-128 into a C-64. The memory capacity of the C-128 is halved, but your computer is now compatible with the entire line of C-64 peripherals and is capable of running C-64's games, graphics, music software and more.

The C-128 also features a CP/M mode, which opens up CP/M software availability to run such programs as WordStar, dBase II and the Perfect line of software.

Uses

The new machine is being touted as ideal for businessmen, students and home users. Of course, as you may recall, the C-64 was also billed as well-suited for home, business and educational use. But the C-128's claim is much more substantiated. With a 40/80-column color display, expand-

Commodore has not yet finalized, but which promises to be well under that of the nearest competitors—the Apple IIc and the IBM PCjr. If so, the C-128 will attract anyone who is thinking of upgrading his C-64 or who is looking for more serious computer applications than the C-64 affords.

The newly introduced peripherals, too, lend credence to the image of the 128 as a more serious computer. With a mouse; a faster, 350K disk drive; a monochrome monitor; an RGB color monitor; and 1660 and 1670 modems, as well as the recently announced daisywheel printer, the DPS-1101 (see January 1985 *RUN*, p. 80), the new C-128 owner will be well-equipped for business and telecommunications, as well as home and educational applications.

A Plucky Company

Firmly entrenched as the leader in the low-cost home computer market, Commodore is entering the higher-priced arena to tackle IBM and Apple for a share of the lucrative market that most analysts predict exists.

In the ad that first announced its new computer, Commodore takes Apple and IBM head on and lists capabilities of the C-128 not found in the Apple IIc and IBM PCjr. With its history of offering quality equipment at the lowest prices possible, Commodore states that the C-128 spells good news for the industry, but "bad news for IBM and Apple."

In describing the 128 as its first "personal computer," Commodore appears to be straddling both the home and business markets. It seem to be saying, "The C-128 is not strictly a home computer, nor is it strictly a business machine. But, with its added capabilities, it can handle more advanced applications than the C-64."

In future issues, *RUN* will be taking a closer look at the C-128 and charting its progress among both readers and support manufacturers. As always, reader input is most welcome.

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

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How to type listings from

RUN

Typing in listings can be difficult enough without having to worry about strange graphics characters, charts or tables. That's why we decided to make it easy to enter listings from *RUN* by translating everything we thought might be confusing in any program.

When you see something between the curly brackets, all you have to do is press the keys indicated. For example:

{SHIFT L}—means hold down the shift key and press the L key at the same time.

{COMD J}—means hold down the Commodore key (it is on the lower left side of the keyboard) and press the J key at the same time.

{SHIFT CLR}—hold down the shift key and press the CLR/HOME key.

{HOME}—press the CLR/HOME key without shifting.

{CTRL 6}—hold down the control key and press the 6 key.

{FUNCT 2}—function 2 (in this case, you hold down the shift key and press the function 1 key).

{CRSR UP}{CRSR DN}{CRSR LF}{CRSR RT}—these are the four cursor directions.

{UP ARROW}—means the arrow key (the one with the pi sign under it).

{LB.}—the British pound sign (£).

{PI}—the pi sign key (π); (shift and press the up arrow key).

In some instances, when a large number of characters or spaces are repeated in a listing, we will represent them this way: {22 spaces} or {17 CRSR LFs}.

Print vs Print#

RUN readers should be aware of difficulties that may arise when entering listings that contain the PRINT and PRINT# commands.

These two commands may look very similar, but they are different. If, for example, you use a question mark (?) to abbreviate PRINT in a line such as 10 PRINT#4,A\$, then you are signaling to the Commodore computer that you are trying to print the variable #4, which is not a legal variable name.

The command PRINT#4 actually means "print to file number 4." You can abbreviate PRINT# by hitting the P key and the shift and R keys at the same time and then entering the file number. But *do not* abbreviate PRINT# with a question mark.

If you think of PRINT as one command and PRINT# as an entirely different command, then you should have no problems.

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

There's some great magic here for you this month, whether your interest is in disk drives, printers, programming, or just in typing in a program to see what it does. As always, we match our subject matter to the interest expressed in our mail, and, basically, that's a broad cross section of computing. We think of our contributors as the most creative souls in computerdom, and month after month they prove us right. Since our contributors and readers are one and the same, that puts you in very good company. Behold what your colleagues have wrought:

\$1A5 C-64 wedge feature—Commodore's famous wedge program contains a not-so-famous way of organizing files on the disk. When using the wedge to save, if you end your filename with a single character enclosed in square brackets, that character will magically be moved to the sixteenth position in the filename!

In wedge jargon, that sixteenth character is called the volume identifier. If you save several files with the same volume ID, the wedge will let you access them as a group.

If you're saving without the wedge, you can manually put a volume identifier in the sixteenth position of your filename, so you can use it later on.

To use the volume identifier, you must be running the wedge, and you can use any wedge command,

including @COPY, @RENAME, @SCRATCH and especially @\$\$. The wedge looks for the last character in each filename when you specify a volume ID between the square brackets. For example, you can save a file by entering:

```
{LEFT ARROW}HOUDINI[L]
```

It will list in the directory as

```
HOUDINI {8 spaces} L
```

and can be scratched with:

```
@S:HOUDINI[L] {return}
```

To get a directory of all files with volume identifier L, use:

```
@$:*[L] {return}
```

You can scratch all the files with volume identifier L by using

```
@S:*[L] {return}
```

Beware: The dark side of this magic is that the wedge will report the sixteenth character of the filename as the volume ID, whether it is intended as such or not. Make your IDs unique (graphics characters, for instance) and this should be no problem.

\$1A6 Comma files on disk—When experimenting with disk files, simple program errors often cause difficulties with filenames. Sometimes, a file named “,” pops up, which resists all efforts to be killed or renamed. When this happens, just search your directory for any other files with single-character names, then give them longer ones.

When the comma file is the only single-character name on the disk, it can be scratched or renamed by using the filename “?”. The wild-card character (the ?) will match the comma and allow you to do as you wish. After the comma file has been disposed of, you can give the others their original one-character names.

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\$1A7 Dry disk storage—High humidity can cause loading problems when the felt inside your disk becomes slightly damp. You can reduce the problem by storing your disks with a desiccant capsule, such as those packed with vitamin pills. If you don't use vitamins, ask your druggist to give you a desiccant capsule.

\$1A8 Controlling tape errors—If you're working on a program and save it to tape several times with the same name, you could be asking for trouble. When you try to load it, the computer might find an old cut-off version under the same name and give you a Load error. You can usually find the "lost" beginning of your program, but it will take you several attempts. A better solution is to use a different name each time you save a version of the program.

\$1A9 Plus/4 screen Pokes—On the C-64, screen memory starts at 1024, and color memory starts at 55296. On the new Plus/4, screen memory starts at 3072, and color memory starts at 2048. When converting C-64 programs to work on the Plus/4, just add 2048 to C-64 screen Poke locations and subtract 53248 from the C-64 color Poke locations. For example, on the C-64,

```
POKE 1524,1 (letter 'A' in center screen)
POKE 55796,2 (makes it red)
```

would convert to this on the Plus/4:

```
POKE 3572,1 (3572 = 1524 + 2048)
POKE 2548,2 (2548 = 55796 - 53248)
```

The screen map for the C-64 is on page 382 of the C-64 *Programmer's Reference Guide*. The map for the Plus/4 is on page 199 of the user's manual that comes with the computer. (The Plus/4's luminance feature may make it necessary to also change the value Poked to color memory. Ed.)

\$1AA Plus/4 and C-16 tips—(Untested. Ed.) To disable the stop key, enter POKE 806,103. Return to normal by entering POKE 806,101. Unlike the 64, all keys repeat on the new machines. To emulate the 64, with only cursor keys, insert/delete and space repeating, enter POKE 1344,0. Return to flying text by entering POKE 1344,128.

Empty the keyboard buffer with POKE 239,0. Key-presses are detected at memory location 2038, much as they are in the C-64 and VIC in location 197. The values returned are generally the same as those for the 64 (see trick \$3E, in *RUN's* April 1984 issue, or run

\$1AB RUNDY—Have you ever typed in RUN over READY? If you have, the computer probably printed the familiar Undef'd Statement error. But if your program starts with line number zero, it will run no matter what follows RUN on the screen.

\$1AC Improved reverse characters—After typing CTRL 9, type in some words and look closely at them. The uppercase characters are not completely surrounded by reverse video, so they look cut off at the top. They will take on a more professional look if you put a row of COMD@ characters, CHR\$(164), just above the reverse characters needing the improvement.

\$1AD Centered printing—Trick \$7F in June's *RUN* can also be accomplished using a function instead of a subroutine. You can center A\$ on the screen as follows.

```
100 DEF FNC(X) = 20 - (LEN(A$)/2)
110 More program lines, if desired

700 A$ = "PRESTIDIGITATION" : PRINT TAB(FNC(X));A$
710 A$ = "IS" : PRINT TAB(FNC(X));A$

The X is a dummy argument, not used, but required to avoid a Syntax error. For the VIC, use 11 rather than 20 in line 100.

\$1AE Magic flasher—This subroutine can make all or part of your screen prompt flash on and off. It adds a little class and pizzazz, with very little effort.

520 PRINT "{2 CRSR UP}" : IF PEEK(162)AND32 THEN PRINT

A Gosub 500 will put the prompt on the screen, with the first two words flashing. The rate of flash is set by Peeking a bit in the real time clock. For a faster rate, replace the 32 in line 520 with a 1, 2, 4, 8 or 16. For a slower rate, use 64 or 128. Moving the RVS OFF

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
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Until Mitey Mo, Commodore's 1650 Automodem was the obvious choice when you went looking for a modem for the C-64. Like Mitey Mo, it has "auto-answer"—it receives data while unattended. And both modems are "auto dialers"—you dial right on the computer's keyboard. But that's about where their similarity ends.

Suppose you dial a number,

and you find that it's busy. Mitey Mo has "auto redial"—it hangs up and redials immediately until it gets through. With the other modem you have to redial each time—and somebody with auto redialing can slip in ahead of you.

Mitey Mo is menu-driven. It lists the things you can do on the screen. Select a number and you're on your way. Since Automodem isn't menu-driven, you'll be hunting through the manual a lot.

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easy to use. With the other modem you'll have to remember to check three switches, otherwise you may be answering when you mean to be originating.

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Search/Update. To recall a particular form, all you need to remember is any one piece of information that you cataloged. Any segment of any field can retrieve a form. You can use double periods to precede, follow or substitute for any combination of letters or numbers that you may not be able to remember. And if you can recall nothing about how an item was filed, then you can call up every entry on the disk until you find the one you need.

Remove. This option permits the deletion of any or all forms in a file. A warning message is displayed before any item is permanently deleted, to prevent accidental loss of data.

Print. This allows you to print out either an entire form or only certain segments of a form (in a predefined, flexible format). Print specifications can be saved, so you need only design a particular print format once.

There is also a Sort function, which will organize a number of forms in ascending order. However, the fields will be printed in the order in which they appear on a particular form and cannot be juggled. To change their order, you must go to Design File.

One obvious problem with PFS: File is that you cannot create multiple files on one disk. Since a disk can hold approximately 1000 forms, using an entire disk for 20 or 30 items is a waste of time and disk space. It would be more efficient to have multiple files on the same disk, so that related small files could be grouped together (e.g., birthdays and anniversaries).

PFS: File's ease of use makes it a program worth owning. Following the tutorial in the manual should take you no longer than one hour. It is concise, clear and compact.

All PFS programs work together to form an integrated software family. PFS: Report can combine with PFS: File to further refine your records. The Report program (which only works with PFS: File) generates summaries, tables and basic math functions. PFS: File is unable to crunch numbers, so in some applications the use of the Report program will be a necessity.

Although PFS: File will not accomplish anything that you couldn't do yourself, with plenty of paper and a lot of time, it will make your record-

keeping much more efficient and add a professional finish to your files. (Software Publishing Corp., 1901 Landings Drive, Mountain View, CA 94043. C-64/\$79.95 disk.)

Robotron:2084 **B**

*The Robots Are Revolting!
Can You Stop Them or
Will They Rule the World?*

The scenario in Robotron:2084 is simple. The robots that were created initially to help mankind suddenly turn on their makers, and the only humans left on earth are clones. Your mission is to save those remaining humans, keeping yourself alive at the same time. This is not as easy as it may sound.

You are armed with only an anti-robot laser gun, which isn't nearly enough. Your enemies are not particularly fast, but there is an endless supply of them and they have weapons of their own. The mindless grunts are the most numerous of your robot foes. They will not stop their relentless pursuit until you zap them, or until they catch you. And there are the indestructible hulks that seem to wander aimlessly—but not quite harmlessly. And watch out for the giant brains; they are not very fleet of foot, but they fire cruise missiles that will seek you out no matter where you run. Spheroids, enforcer embryos, galvanizing electrodes, cubic quarks, torturing tanks and bounce bombs all have only one mission—to kill you.

The one very simple key to playing Robotron:2084 is to shoot everything that moves. If an object doesn't vaporize and isn't an indestructible hulk, then it is most likely a clone, which you should touch (thus saving it) before it is turned into a mutant frog by a giant brain or is annihilated by a hulk. But be careful not to let anything touch you.

If you can manage to clear the grunts from the screen (as well as

anything else that might be moving around), you will move onto the next level. After five levels, the giant brains appear and must be destroyed before they can launch their missiles. It doesn't end there, either. You must still fight the sinister spheroids, enforcer embryos, cubic quarks, torturing tanks and bounce bombs.

If you are coming to the conclusion that Robotron:2084 is a confusing, chaotic and frantic game, you are right. This is probably one of the most difficult shoot-'em-up games to come along. The first few times you play, don't expect to live very long. There is so much going on that you could play for hours before you discover all the aspects of the game. There is nothing educational about Robotron:2084, nothing meaningful and no deep or hidden messages. There's just fast action and fun.

Robotron:2084 is one of the better arcade game conversions from Atari-soft. It is available on cartridge for both the C-64 and VIC-20. Although they have the same name, rules, packaging and general play-action, the C-64 version is clearly the better of the two. The VIC-20 version is a bit clumsier and the graphics are not nearly as detailed.

I would recommend Robotron:2084 to anyone who enjoys joystick action arcade games. It will challenge even the most skillful fire-button fiends from the first minute, to the fiftieth, to the five hundredth. This is a better than average game that is frustratingly fun. Seastalker is Infocom's first junior-level interactive fiction game. It is designed for ages 9 and up. The key phrase here is "and up"; it is enjoyable on an adult level, and it can serve

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


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as a painless introduction to text adventuring for the faint of heart.

In *Seastalker*, you are the inventor of the Scimitar, a two-seater sub that has yet to be tested under real use. While working in your lab, you receive a message from your colleagues at the Aquadome, an undersea research center, that they are in trouble. Communications are interrupted, though, and you don't know what the trouble is, other than it is serious enough to threaten the Aquadome's existence. You must find out what the problem is and solve it, using the Scimitar and the help of various crew members, one or more of whom may be traitors!

This brief synopsis gives only a hint of the scope of this adventure. The various places (lab, sub, Aquadome, Fropton Bay), the numerous characters (nine others besides yourself) and all the different equipment (sonarphone, depth finder, emergency survival kit, computestor, to name a few) give a seemingly never-ending variety to the game.

While the program is close to perfect, the packaging is even better. The main folder opens to reveal a nautical chart of Fropton Bay, at the edge of which your lab is situated. You must navigate the bay in your sub to get to open ocean and the Aquadome; there are shoals, rock spires and submerged wrecks to avoid. (Or, maybe you should investigate the wrecks instead!)

Inside the folder is the Scimitar Logbook. Two pages each are devoted to the sub itself, the lab and the Aquadome.

Also included in the folder are eight Top Secret Infocards. One side of each card gives a brief biography of some of the characters in the story; the other side has hidden clues to help you along in the game. Even the hints force you to think, however; in each one, a blank space appears instead of a key word or phrase. If you need further proof of Infocom's attention to detail, there is also a Discovery Squad Badge included.

By the way, Infocom's adventure games have no graphics, but when was the last time you read a good book that needed illustrations? *Infocom* (55 Wheeler St., Cambridge, MA 02138. C-64/\$49.95 disk.)

Dancing Feats C

*Compose Your Own Songs
And Discover the Musical
Potential of Your C-64*

Some of the products designed to take advantage of the Commodore 64's musical ability are close to

true synthesizers, while others are more simplistic, and are really just noisemakers. In the middle of this range of products is *Dancing Feats* from Softsync. This program allows you to compose simple pieces of music.

Dancing Feats supplies you with a backup band, to which you add the main melody, using a joystick to control the notes. From the Main menu, you can select the bass, beat, style, tempo and ending music of your backup band.

Each choice you make reveals another menu. For example, the options available to you on the Choose Beat menu are: Cool, Beguine, Syncopated and Dance.


The screen that displays the music shows eight horizontal lines, and with the combination of backup parameters that you selected playing simultaneously, you use the joystick to enter the main melody. The joystick's eight positions correspond with the standard eight-note musical octave. As you move the joystick, vertical, colored bars appear above the notes you are creating; at the bottom of these bars are the names of the notes. You can change the octave of the notes you select by pressing the fire button; a line in the lower-left corner tells you the chord of the current musical phrase. You may also dispense with the backup band and compose your music without accompaniment.

To end a composition, press the space bar to play the finale that you selected earlier.

Nothing is stored, either on disk or in the internal memory of the computer, unless you type R (for Record) at the Main menu. According to the instructions, one hour's worth of music can be stored in memory by using this command. Only one piece at a time can be in memory, so if you load one song right after another, the first will disappear. (For some reason, a cappella pieces cannot be recorded.) After storing, you can play back your composition.

The documentation supplied with *Dancing Feats* consists of a small pamphlet, which glosses over most musical terms with cursory definitions. The program's commands and functions are fully explained and nothing that you may need is omitted. A Command Summary at the

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
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end of the instructions provides a handy reference to the program.

Dancing Feats does suffer from a few problems. The first (and most important) is that a joystick was not designed to be a musical instrument, and it sometimes slips ever so slightly, so that you wind up with two notes where you only wanted one. It would have been helpful if Softsync had allowed for the use of the keyboard as an alternative to a joystick.

Another problem is the quality of the backup band. While they never miss a beat, the rhythm section is fuzzy and the music begins to sound more or less the same no matter what selections you make in the starting menus.

Although you can enter notes as quickly as you can move the joystick, you can't make those notes last longer than a conventional eighth-note, which is very limiting if you want to compose anything more sophisticated than quick, jazzy numbers.

Also, the Save and Load functions need some work. There is no way to get a list of what compositions are on a particular disk while you are in Dancing Feats. And if you try to save a piece using the same name as a song already on the disk, Dancing Feats does not let you know that the Save was unsuccessful. A few more programming lines could have solved this problem.

Dancing Feats is billed as "The

One-Man Joystick Band." Like other one-man bands I've heard, the quality of the music produced is secondary to the novelty of one person being able to mimic an entire band. While Dancing Feats is an easy way to explore some of the musical capabilities of your Commodore 64, the program's limitations may leave you frustrated before long. (Softsync, Inc., 14 East 34th St., New York, NY 10016. C-64/\$29.95 disk.)

If you like plenty of action in your games, then Juno First might be what you're looking for.

Gameplay is initiated with the joystick or joysticks (either one or two people can play). This version by Datasoft is a translation of the arcade game of the same name. If you don't remember the arcade version of Juno First, it's no surprise, as it was not a particularly popular game.

The graphics are relatively sparse

and the sound effects are only mediocre, but the quality of the animation is good. The continuing challenge level of the game is fairly high, and the action is very exciting indeed!

The scenario is this: You're traveling through space at warp speed when you encounter a fleet of (presumably) hostile alien ships. These enemy ships are approaching very quickly from the horizon directly in front of you, and your job is to blast them before they can destroy you. Although the plot is fairly simplistic, accomplishing this task is far from simple. These aliens just don't quit!

The game comes on both disk and cassette in the same box. This double-media format is a good idea, since you'll always have a backup copy of the game.

If you're looking for strategy, a plot, stunning graphics or pleasant music, you'll probably have to keep on looking. On the other hand, if you just happen to have an itchy trigger finger, Juno First will give you plenty of arcade action. (Datasoft, 19808 Nordhoff Place, Chatsworth, CA 91311. The Tax Manager

*Manage Your Taxes
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The Tax Manager is one of several tax preparation programs that allow you to enter all of your tax information into your C-64 for automatic calculation and subsequent printing of facsimile tax forms. What sets this program apart from most similar efforts is the inclusion of a tax guide to help you determine exactly which forms and schedules you are required to fill out, and a tax checklist to remind you of any deductions that you may have overlooked.

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If you're not sure which tax forms you are required or eligible to file, the tax guide takes you through a series of several yes or no questions to help you determine which forms to use. When you've completed the questionnaire, a simple keystroke will give you an on-screen list of all the necessary forms.

In order to help you take full advantage of any deductions for which you might be eligible and to ensure that you don't overlook any income that you are required to report, The Tax Manager provides a nine-category checklist. Categories include Taxable Income Items, Business or Professional Deductions, Energy Tax Credit Items, Non-Deductible Items and Items Not Taxable. Each category can be reviewed in its entirety or searched for keywords.

Once you've learned which forms you must file, what deductions you're eligible to take and the income you

must declare, you are ready to begin preparing the forms. At the Tax Preparation menu you can select both the proper forms and the automatic sequence in which they should appear on the screen. Available are forms 1040, 1040EZ, 1040ES, 2106, 2210, 2119, 2441, 3468, 3903, 4625, 4797, 5695 and 6251, as well as schedules A through G, R and RP, SE and W.

While in the process of entering tax information, you can use the function keys to move back and forth among the various forms. Another useful feature of The Tax Manager is the automatic transfer of information between forms. For example, once you've calculated your net profit on Schedule C, you can return to the 1040 form to find the amount already in place on line 12 (Business Income).

At any point, all forms and information can be saved on disk or printed out. Except for the 1040, all

forms and schedules are printed in acceptable IRS formats. Information from the 1040 can be printed on plain white paper and then combined with a transparency of an actual 1040 (not included in the package) to produce an acceptable copy.

Obviously, if you only file a few tax forms each year, you'll want to think twice before spending \$74.95 for more options than you'll probably ever use in a lifetime. If, however, each tax season finds you buried beneath an ever-increasing pile of tax forms, then The Tax Manager could be just what you need. It is one of the most powerful and complete tax preparation programs available. (MicroLab, Inc., 2699 Skokie Valley Road, Highland Park, IL 60035. C-64/ \$74.95 disk.)

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
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
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MONEY MANAGER

In the August 1978 issue of *Kilobaud* magazine, there's an interesting financial calculator program for the old 8K PET ("FINANC: A Home/Small-Business Financial Package," by Les Palenik). I've used this program quite a lot and found it extremely helpful on more than one occasion. I decided to resurrect this program for the new group of Commodore 64 users.

During the many years I've used this program, I've been cleaning up and condensing it somewhat. I deleted the depreciation calculations, since they didn't seem appropriate for the home user, and I then combined the remaining functions into one large function menu, instead of having a number of smaller menus. I also cleaned up the print formatting and overall program flow. My version is about half the size of the original program, with about one-third the number of lines.

When you start the program, you'll see a large menu showing the various

calculations that the program can perform:

Simply enter the number of the desired function. From then on, the program will prompt you for any necessary information. The computed results will be displayed with all values rounded to the nearest cent. You'll then be given an option to perform another calculation of the same type, using different values.

If you don't choose another calculation, you'll be returned to the main menu, where you may select another function or press 9 to

terminate the program. To keep things simple, the program does not do any input validation, nor does it protect against input errors.

Several input prompts request a time period in years and months. When answering these prompts, you must enter two numbers separated by a comma. If you accidentally enter only one value, the computer will display two question marks and let you enter the second value. If anything seems to get out of whack, try

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

Here's a program that lets you keep track of your real estate expenses and income while providing a realistic analysis of your investments.

Silent Partner, the

LANDLORD'S HELPER


Most owners of rental property become expert painters and fair plumbers. The hardest skill to learn, however, is figuring out why the operating account always needs more money. Investing in real estate is within the reach of most working people and can be an important step toward financial security.

What the Program Does

The main purpose of Silent Partner is to report and summarize the pertinent facts about your property's operation. The printout is similar to the monthly statement a rental management company would provide. It shows all sources of income (including the "deposits by owner" category), each expense by type and amount and the resulting totals.

Each expense is broken down as a percentage of total expenses and a percentage of rental income. This helps you spot problems that might not be obvious from glancing through the checkbook ledger. If repairs are averaging 50% of income, it's time to consider selling the house while it's still standing.

The program also does some basic investment analysis. It averages cash

flow and, armed with purchase price and down payment, computes gross rent multiplier and return on equity. Over a period of time, the results of these calculations reveal the fiscal facts about the performance of your investment.

Although the program is not designed as a checkbook balancer, the printout should run a close parallel to your banking records. If you pay attention to beginning balances each month and include bank charges under miscellaneous expense, Silent Partner will get along fine with the bank.

Before printing, you can save each month's entries on a disk file. Each sequential file is automatically named by

recombining the month with the first two characters of the property's address.

For example, the file containing July's entries for 912 Austin Street would be saved as "91JULY." This way, records for more than one property can be kept on the same disk.

After collecting files for a few months, several can be read into memory and totaled for a quarterly or year-end summary. This printout gives you a good perspective of long term operation by smoothing

out the effects of unusual or temporary occurrences, such as a vacancy. The year-end printout is helpful in projecting future cash flow or in comparing several properties, and is especially handy at tax time.

Since most mortgage companies impound real estate tax and insurance installments along with the monthly loan payment, the program's loan category is PITI (principal, interest, taxes and insurance). When the mortgage company sends you an interest-paid notice at the end of the year, pencil in the breakdown on the year-end printout.

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

additional rental property. Estimate income and expense, enter asking price and down payment, and let the computer forecast the bottom line. The program can help evaluate other "what if" situations, too. Maybe you are renting a house for \$500, utilities included. How would overall return be affected by offering the property at \$425 with the tenant paying the electric bill? Run the program with modified figures and compare the results.

User's Manual

When the program is run, the menu presents you with two choices: enter data or read from files. When selecting the former, you supply the property's address and the month. Then each category of income and expense is displayed, prompting you for the amount. If there is no entry for a particular item, just hit the return key and the program will enter a 0.

When all the prompts have been answered, you have a chance to review the entries and correct any mistakes before continuing. After you've approved the facts and figures, the entries are saved as a file. The program is then ready to print the monthly summary.

If you select the Read From Files option, you supply the month (or the first and last months for a multi-month summary) and the first two characters of the desired property's address. The beginning balance will be picked off the first month as it's read in, and any security deposit liability is taken from the last month. The other categories are totaled for the printout.

You can take a shortcut around entering the same address, purchase price and down payment each month by first reading in a previous file. Then go to the menu and opt for the Enter Data option, which allows you to overwrite that month's numbers while preserving the other information. Since it's already in memory, you won't have to type it again.

The top and bottom function keys are used throughout the program. The f1 key returns you to the menu, and f7 causes something to happen, like starting the printer or sending a file to disk.

Silent Partner works on the Plus/4 if you make a minor addition to line 220:

KEY1, F1\$: KEY7, F7\$

Also, since KEY is a reserved word on the Plus/4, replace the variable

KEY with FLAG in lines 470, 870, 1990 and 2400.

Fit to Your Needs

If my choice of categories doesn't fit your situation, it's easy to modify the arrays. For example, replacing condo fees with pool chemicals requires just one substitution in the Data line.

Separating taxes and insurance from the mortgage payment can be done the same way. If my printout lacks something you consider vital, such as capitalization rate or depreciation, it shouldn't be too difficult

to add the calculation and have it printed.

Datassette owners can modify the Open lines at the beginning of the file read/write modules. No other changes should be necessary. I use the program with a Commodore MPS-801 printer; if your printer is non-Commodore, some brief trial and error may be needed to get the printout just right.

While Silent Partner won't rain-proof a roof or keep the plumbing in good order, it will give you an

indication of whether a rental should send cash flow into or out of your wallet, and some of the reasons why.

This program helps you balance the books and evaluate the performance of your invested dollars. It's flexible, easy to work with and may be the source of useful information in your financial planning. R

Invoices are a critical part of almost every business; this program provides the answer to every businessperson's invoice printing problems.

EASY INVOICES

An invoice is the most important piece of paper that is generated by a business. It establishes a record of cash flow, accounts receivable, inventory and so on.

Via your C-64 computer and printer, this program will print a professional, ready-made invoice for your customers. The original program appeared in a book entitled *Small Business Programs for the Commodore 64*, by S. Roberts, published by Elcomp Publishing, Inc. I was given permission by Elcomp's owner, Mr. Hofacker, to modify and use the program in this article.

To print out my invoices, I used a Commodore 1525E printer (10 characters per inch). However, with modifications to this program, you should be able to use any printer. You may also change the program's parameters for any layout of your choosing. Note that the program does all the calculating, right down to the invoice total, and also prints a shipping label.

The program is user-friendly and will print sections of the invoice as data is input. You must enter the date, the first invoice number (which the program will automatically increment with each new invoice), the account number, terms and so on.

When you are requested to input the items sold, enter only the item number. The program will search the Data statements (lines 2010, 2020, 2030, 2040 and 2050) for the item numbers, matching description and unit price.

After the last item is printed on the invoice—for final input—type 0 and press the return key. When the invoice is completed, the program will do all the necessary calculations—add up the items, prices, shipping costs and sales tax—and deduct the discount (if you so desire). The invoice will be printed with a shipping label.

Program Line Information

Your products or services should be assigned item numbers tied to a description, with unit prices in Data statements at the end of the program. In this example, refer to lines 2010, 2020, 2030, 2040 and 2050. If you have more items to list, then continue by adding more Data statements. The final Data line must read, for example,

```
2050 DATA 0,0,0
```

for the program to run properly. Once you have established your item numbers in the program, then you

must save your corrected invoice program on a formatted disk with a new name. This will be the disk that you will load to do your invoicing until you change items or pricing.

Discounts are contained in lines 700 to 730. You can alter these to suit your needs. S1 refers to the units shipped to the customer. For example, line 710:

```
IF (S1 > 0) AND (S1 < 30) THEN D = .25
```

means that if you had replied yes to the discount prompt—the quantity shipped was 25—the computer would execute line 710. Since 25 items were shipped and the quantity 25 was greater than 0 but less than 30, a 25% discount would be extended to the customer. Line 720 is 33½%, line 730 is 40%.


Shipping costs are contained in lines 740 to 790. You can also alter these to suit your needs. The same quantity shipped (S1) determines the shipping costs, and you can change it in the same manner as in the above paragraph.

In the example invoice (see Table 1), shipping cost was automatically calculated based on the number (S1) of items shipped. The program also asks a question as to the dollar

amount that should be charged for shipping costs (if the shipping costs will exceed the built-in program factors). Just type the dollar amount of the actual shipping costs that should be included in the invoice.

When inputting date information, abbreviate those months that exceed four letters (JAN, FEB, MAR, etc.). Also, don't type a comma after the day of the month; for example, type the date as Sept. 20 1984.

For additional copies of the invoice, I would suggest that you obtain fanfold (tractor-feed) computer paper that will give you an original and two copies. The additional copies are obtained by paper that doesn't require carbon. This will give you all the required copies—original to customer, second copy for your receivables file, and the third copy for your packing slip. Remember, there are shipping labels for you when the invoice is printed.

Your company's name, address, and so on is entered in lines 530 to 555 and lines 1300 to 1320.

This program has a Decimal Alignment subroutine in lines 1410 to 1570. Every business program must print dollars and cents. This subroutine aligns the decimal and adds 0 or .00 to the calculation.

If at some later date you do have preprinted invoices, this program can be tailored to print through your printer and fill in the proper spaces of your invoice. Just change the space, tab and lines to fit your own invoice in this program.

The application of sales taxes will vary by state. I would urge you to contact your local state sales tax office. This program calculates the sales tax on the cost of the freight and includes it in the sales tax. Line 1060 contains the sales tax calculation on the freight.

This line includes sales tax on freight.

1060 M1=(T-D1)*TR

This line excludes sales tax on freight.

Tax is calculated on the net amount (total amount less discount, if any).





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

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This miniature spreadsheet program handles 100 entries in a 10 × 10 grid, plus column and row headings, and is useful for calculating small tables of numbers.

MINI-CALC

As listed here, this program will only run on the VIC-20 with a Super or 3K expander. I wanted to include a stripped-down version for the 3.5K VIC, but there just wasn't enough memory.

The Format

To see the program's format, look first at Table 1.

Mini-Calc is set up just like this. When you view it, however, its appearance is slightly different.

When run, it first deletes the lines holding the Data statements (this part utilizes the *dynamic* keyboard and will be seen on the screen). It then prompts you to input row names and column names, which stay the same throughout the rest of the program. Next, "LOAD DATA?" appears. When you first run the program, press N in response, since a datafile has not even been created. After this, the screen is set up with the title (and other information) at the top and four "windows" below.

The spreadsheet is now ready. It displays the first five row names you typed in and fills all columns with

zeroes. It also shows the first four column names (in blue).

To avoid any misunderstanding, columns are vertical and rows are horizontal. A row total is just a sum of all numbers in that row; likewise, a column total is the sum of all numbers in that column. The totals cannot be edited like the other numbers and are automatically updated as you work with the spreadsheet (you will see this later).

The first window holds columns A and B, while columns C and D are below in the second window. The bottom left window holds the row names, while to the right are the row totals. Below each column should be printed, in reversed black, a column total.

To see those rows not immediately visible, press the space bar. To scroll back, use the L key.

To view those columns not immediately visible, press the > and < keys; you needn't use the shift key with them. Moving to the left and right might look a little weird because I used the same assembly-language routine that I used on the up

and down movement. Don't worry, though; everything is in its proper place. Just remember that the names and totals at the bottom correspond directly to the other numbers exactly the way you see them.

For example, the row name at the top of the bottom left window (and the total on the other side) is in direct relation to all numbers at the *top* of the other windows.

Entering Numbers

Now that scrolling and viewing the numbers is clear (I hope), let's enter some numbers. Press the £ (British pound sign) key, and a little window will be displayed next to "< --data entry."

Also, the *simulated cursor* (a black square) has moved from the word "scroll" to the first window. The cursor is your guide to whatever you're doing on the screen. If you want to scroll through the numbers, you must position the cursor at the word "scroll." If you want to enter numbers, you must position it beside the number you want to change and so on.

Now, type in any number, care-

fully. If you type a number larger than six digits before the decimal, the program will accept only the first six digits and enter them automatically. Likewise, only two digits after the decimal point are accepted and entered. This assures that the number has only two decimal places and is no higher than 999999.99. The negative range is up to -99999.99 (this is usually high enough for most uses).

If your number was within range, such as 22, 35.7 or -497.2, then hit the £ key to enter it.

After the number is entered, the cursor moves down one space, ready for another entry. If you want to skip over numbers, just hold down the £ key. When you do this, you'll notice that the cursor travels through each column of numbers and back to the word "scroll." Thus, to move to any number and to enter a number, you

only have to use one key, the British pound sign.

If you make an error when entering a number (for example, if you enter something like .5.65 or 5.6-7), the program will usually enter 0.

Another note about the automatic entry after typing two numbers past the decimal: If you want to enter whole numbers, you may type the decimal and two zeroes, and they will enter without hitting the £ key. Also, as you enter your numbers into the spreadsheet, you'll notice column and row totals being updated.

Formula Entry

Now, on to the matter of formula entry. To enter a formula, the cursor must be situated beside "scroll." Next, hit the ↑ (up-arrow) key, and the cursor will move to the home position, lying on the A. Now, you can enter any formula you choose. The format of the formula is as follows: The quantity in the result column equals any column or the letter N (*, /, -, + or ,) any column or the letter N.

Using this format, the steps for entering the formula are as follows:

Step 1. Type in any letter A through J. This is where the result of the calculation is stored.

Step 2. Type in the = sign.

Step 3. Type any letter A through J or the letter N.


Step 4. Type any of the five operators: * / - + ,

Step 5. Type any letter A through J or the letter N.

Steps 1, 2 and 3 will always be followed. In other words, you can't have a formula such as "B =". Steps 4 and 5 can be repeated until the space provided fills up.

Therefore, you can have a formula as simple as "A = B" or as complicated as "A = B*C/H + N". The calculations are done in the order that they appear in the formula and *not* in the usual (*, /, +, -) order that some versions of Basic incorporate. Also, you may have noticed in step 4 an unusual operator—the comma. This character performs exponentiation and will be explained later.

After formula entry is complete, hit the ↑ key. The cursor will move down next to "N =". The formula is entered but will not actually take effect until the variable N is entered. This is any number that you may want included in the formula; however, instead of typing something like "A = B*C + 2.06", you would type "A = B*C + N". Then, when the cursor drops down



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next to the "N=" on the screen, the value "2.06" would be typed.

After you have entered a value for the variable N, use the \pounds key to initiate the formula. In a few seconds (usually), the results of the calculation will show on the screen, and the cursor should be positioned back at "scroll."

Other Features

There are some other features of the spreadsheet I should mention.

First, I stated earlier that no number larger than 999999.99 can be entered. If, however, the program enters a number larger than this as a result of a formula calculation, the number entered would be 999999. If you see this after a formula entry, you'll know that the number calculated was too high to be displayed.

Another number, which you will probably see more often, is 100000. Again, the program will enter this after a formula calculation if a certain condition exists—division by 0. As you probably know, computers will not divide by 0. If a program tries this, you get an error message (the same way a calculator displays a row of Es).

To avoid this error message, which would stop the program, I wrote the instructions so that a division-by-0 condition is skipped over, and the number 100000 is entered.

The last feature is the Disk Save routine. When you have finished working with your spreadsheet and are ready to quit, press S. Type in your filename and press the return key. Your spreadsheet will be completely saved to disk and the program will end.

Additional Remarks

Now that I've covered just about everything you need to know to put the spreadsheet to work, I would like to add a few minor points.

If you realize you typed in a wrong number for N in your formula, there is a solution. If you hit the \uparrow key, this will place the cursor back to the home position. Now you can type the right formula, hit the \uparrow key and type another number for N.

Also, another editing feature to use is the \pounds key. After typing the formula, the \uparrow key erases any remains of the "old" formula. Using the \pounds key instead does not erase anything. This is useful in changing just part of a formula.

If you want to advance through the columns, you can press the + key

A Spreadsheet Example

I thought it might be helpful to briefly run through a typical spreadsheet application. You will no doubt come up with better spreadsheets than this, but it does show the usefulness of a program like this when calculating columns of numbers. Also, I will try to tie up some loose ends, especially the use of the comma (,) as an operator.

A money-management book I recently purchased included a table showing the possible effect different inflation rates could have on a typical household budget. I have created a similar table below, which will be used as our spreadsheet example.

You'll notice that only the first column is filled with numbers. These are the only ones that need to be typed. The other columns will be generated via formulas.

First, run the program. Next, type N after the question "LOAD DATA?" and then start entering the row and column names. It's probably best to enter these names in the same order as seen in the chart, but any order will work. Also, the program only accepts 7 (column) or 9 (row) letters in a name, so try to abbreviate.

When the screen is set up, enter that first column of numbers under the "\$ AMT PER YR." column. Here is where the order of entering data is important. You may remember I stated earlier that any column of data corresponds directly to any other data according to screen position. This means, for example, that if the name "CLOTHING" is three rows down in the bottom left window, then its corresponding data should be typed in at the third row of its window. I stress this point only because it is important to get a feel for what corresponds to what as you scroll through different columns.

Now it is time to let the program create the rest. Simply type in the following formulas with their corresponding "N=" values in the same order as they are listed.

B = A/N	B = B*N	F = N	C = N,F*A	D = N,F*A	E = N,F*A
N = 11330	N = 100	N = 20	N = 1.06	N = 1.10	N = 1.15

The first and second formulas merely fill column B with a percentage breakdown of the various household expenses. This isn't particularly necessary for this example but may prove useful sometimes.

The third formula stores the number 20 into all of column F (this is a handy way of filling columns with a certain value).

instead of the British pound sign. The difference is that hitting the + key will immediately move the cursor to the top of the next column. This feature is especially handy when, for example, you're changing a number in the first column and then moving on to the word "scroll." Here, all you do is hit the + key four times.

Technical Notes

Included with the program listing is a disassembly of the three machine language routines (see Listing 2) that control the vertical scroll and the number aligning within the windows.

Also, there is a list of line-number ranges for each module of the program (see Table 2) and a chart that reviews which key to press when using the spreadsheet (see Table 3).

The machine language routines are probably the centerpiece of the whole program. Without them, I think that the ability to easily view any number within the matrix would have suffered. I won't go into the workings of these routines except to give a brief description.

The two scroll routines are almost identical. The only difference is that one works somewhat in a reverse

Formulas 4, 5 and 6 are the real workhorses. They are responsible for storing columns C, D and E with the inflated values using percent rates of 6, 10 and 15, respectively. You'll notice that the value for "N=" changes for each rate.

The method for calculating columns C, D and E is based on the general compound-interest formula given below.

$$FV = PV * (1 + i)^N$$

where:

FV = Future Value

PV = Present Value

i = Interest (or inflation) rate

N = Number of periods (or years)

As with any mathematical problem, the expression inside the parentheses is performed first. This is why the "N=" values in the example are set equal to 1.06, 1.10 and 1.15 (1 plus .06, .10 and .15 inflation rates). Next, these values have to be raised to the power of the number of periods (N), or 20 years (column F). Please note that this is accomplished by using the comma as an operator in the "N,F" part of the last three formulas. After this, you multiply by the "Present Values" that were typed into column A. (Thus, the complete formula—Result Column = N,F*A.)

For those of you who may be rusty on your math, another way to express "N,F" is $N * N * N \dots 20$ times. Since it wouldn't be very convenient to have to type in something this long, you can see the reason for having an exponential operator. In other spreadsheet programs (and most versions of Basic), this operator is represented by the \uparrow character. The coding scheme I used in this section of my program did not lend itself well to using this character, so I used the comma character instead.

The purpose of my example is mainly to show you that spreadsheets have many uses. These "what-if" guessing games seem to be most interesting.

As I stated elsewhere in this article, the operations in a formula are executed left to right (parentheses cannot be used). This was the reason for typing the formula as N,F*A instead of A*N,F. The latter would have multiplied column A by N and then raised this result to the power of column F (20).

This final result would not only be erroneous, but would produce numbers so high that the VIC would break out with an Overflow error message. Generally, such an error will only occur by misuse of the exponential operator (comma). A partial solution is available: simply clear the screen and type:

When asked for the datafile name, type it in.

This will start saving your data to your disk. Afterwards, the program will end. As I said, this is only a partial solution. You will have to reload Mini-Calc and bring in the datafile you just saved.

manner from the other. In a scroll, you're either "pushing" everything in the windows up one space or down one space. You do this by loading the accumulator with information from a screen address, using a register (X or Y), then storing that information into the screen address directly above or below, using another register.

Both registers are then incremented or decremented (depending on what scroll you're using), and the next screen address is loaded into the accumulator, repeating the process. Of course, with each routine (up or down), this is taking place on all four

windows almost at the same time.

The third machine language routine is responsible for aligning the numbers within the windows. I tried many other methods of doing this in Basic using string functions, and I found just one solution. This solution is used in printing the column totals but cannot be used with the other numbers because of speed requirements and other reasons.

This machine language routine aligns numbers simply by finding an offset. First, Basic prints the number at a position determined by which number in the spreadsheet is being

changed (or entered). Then the machine language routine is called. This routine searches through the screen locations where the number has been printed, looking at each location and counting until it finds either a space (code 32) or a decimal (code 46). When either one is found, the number of its location is subtracted from 7. The result of this subtraction is then used to shift the number over that many locations.

For example, if the number was 35.8, then the decimal is found at the third location. Three subtracted

from 7 is 4, which means that the number must be shifted over four screen positions. Seven is used because the decimal is to be lined up at the seventh position from where it was originally printed.


One last technique that I think could be useful in any program is the Delete routine. It starts at line 800. Using the dynamic keyboard, it prints the line numbers that hold the Data statements and forces a carriage return over them (you can see this taking place right after typing RUN). This idea was harder to put into practice than I thought.

Originally, I had set the variable LN equal to the first line number to be deleted. After the first deletion, the program was to increment LN so that the next line could be deleted. It wouldn't work. It seemed that after the first line was deleted, all variables were reset to 0, including LN. Because of this, I changed the program so that LN would be incremented on the screen just as if it were being typed in Direct mode. This solved my problem.

Of course, these Data statements hold the machine language portion of the program and are Poked into the cassette buffer before deletion.

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



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

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
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MAKING FACES

By RICH BEACHLER

Like many other Commodore owners, I moved up to the Commodore 64 after starting out with a VIC-20. When I did so, I turned my VIC-20 over to my four-year-old daughter, Aleda.

While there is a wealth of commercial educational software available for the Commodore 64, there is a real dearth of VIC-20 programs, especially those aimed at preschool aged children. Almost all of my daughter's programs come from magazines such as *RUN*.

To add to this scant supply of VIC-20 software for preschoolers, I decided to write an interactive, non-competitive, nonsexist game that would make use of the VIC's custom graphics capability. The result is *Faces*, and I am pleased to say it has become Aleda's present favorite.

Entering Faces

Faces is in two parts. Type in the first part and, before running it, save

it with the name "Faces Loader." If you don't first save this program, it erases itself, after running, to make way for part two.

If you are using disk, make the following change to *Faces Loader*:

Type *NEW* and type in the second part. Save it with the name "Faces." If you are using tape, *Faces* should be saved immediately following *Faces Loader*.

Please note that *Faces* uses all the available memory in an unexpanded VIC-20. Do not type in any spaces except for those inside quotes! Also, it will only run on an unexpanded VIC-20, so remove or disable any memory expansion.


How to Play

Load and run *Faces Loader*, which, in turn, will automatically load and run *Faces*. I added some flashing

words and scrolling colors to the character-loading section of the program. That way, your child can enjoy watching something happen while data is being loaded, rather than staring at a "Please Wait" message.

Soon, a face with a small menu below it will appear, and a very short melody will play. To change any of the facial features listed in the menu, you need only press the appropriate number key. When a choice has been made, a new menu will appear.

If you choose to change the hair, the menu will ask for a choice of style 1 or 2. (The style you see when the program begins is style 1.) After a style has been chosen, the menu will ask for a choice of hair color. To make a selection, you must press the number key corresponding to the number in the desired color. The face will be redrawn with the new hair style and color. The original menu will reappear, and the short tune will play again.



Let's face it, there aren't that many unexpanded VIC-20 programs for preschoolers. Here's one that is not only easy to handle, but also provides your child with hours of pleasurable and creative activity.

If you choose to change any other facial features in the menu, the new menu will instruct you to press the space bar to change, whereupon the change in the chosen feature happens immediately. Continuously pressing the space bar causes the feature to keep changing. When you are satisfied with the choice, press the return key to bring back the original menu.

All the choices have helped my daughter learn to recognize the names of the features and the correct keys to press. She also has found some favorite program features of her own (such as holding down the space bar when changing the eye color, causing the eyes to blink).

If the player chooses the Quit option, all the correct memory pointers are restored, and typing NEW prepares the VIC for any new program.

How It Works

I have redefined the first 64 characters in the character set. (And I use

all 64 of them!) They are stored in locations 7168 to 7679. Poking location 36869 with the value 255 tells the VIC to look for its 2048-byte character set, starting at location 7168. This causes the unexpanded VIC's character set to wrap around into read only memory (ROM). The VIC then sees normal (nonreversed) characters where it would normally see reversed characters. It is then possible to print a message with normal characters by using the CTRL and RVS-on keys.

The hair and the outline of the face are drawn using Print statements. The letters in the Print statements have all been redefined and appear as parts of the face.

The rest of the facial features are poked to the screen. This allows their immediate change without redrawing the entire face. The eyes and nose use two custom characters each. The mouth uses six characters.



Since there was no room for REM

statements in the main program of the VIC-20 version, I will give you a brief program outline.

Lines 10-40. Set variables and strings
Lines 100-240. Draw face and hair
Lines 250-295. Print main menu
Lines 300-350. Change hair

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
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

LISTING/INDEXES/LETTERS AND MORE

Experience the thrill of actually writing your letters and reports on your computer. Now you'll be able to use all of your computer's word processing and correcting capabilities to really explore your creative talents.

It's easy. Some of the new word processing programs are so 'user friendly' that you can learn to use them in just about 10 minutes. Change a line, change a word, move a line. Just push a button.

Are data bases a four letter word? Not on your life. Now you can use your computer to organize all your telephone numbers, your stocks, stamps, and recipes.

If you're using your computer for business, you can have a complete, instantly accessible file for each customer by name, what they bought, when, etc.

A data base will let you find or organize and print out any information you want, whenever you want, whenever you want.

There's no more complicated programming required. And, inexpensive data base programs are available at any computer store.

To do this, lines 10–20 transfer the basic operating system to RAM. Line 30 causes the Ready prompt to be looked for at memory location 828 rather than its usual place. Lines 40–60 put the new prompt into locations 828 on up.

If you put this routine at the beginning of some of your programs, you can have a lot of fun. Line 10 takes some time to do its work, but the results are worth it.

Those who know about CHR\$ codes can construct their own message by changing the Data statements shown here. The first two and the last three must always be as shown, but you can put any reasonable number of characters in between. The possibilities are limitless, and a lot of action can be had from very little work.

\$1B0 Word tricks—It's well known that shifted characters in REM statements can List in unusual ways. Having considered this quirk at length, we've created a brand-new literary form. If you run the program below, you'll see just what we mean.

When typing it, be extremely careful with the characters in the answers; a single error can ruin the entire line. In the answer lines, we've spelled out every character following the colons, since that is the most critical area. As you type, don't put spaces where they're not called for, and carefully watch your shift and Commodore keys. In the answers, all the spaces and a few of the letters are unshifted.

After typing the program, you should save it first, then run it and follow the instructions. The quotes to be deleted are those at the beginning of the answer lines.

\$1B2 Defining variables—It is sometimes desirable to define Basic variables in a certain order, particularly where execution speed is critical, and we want frequently used variables to be at the top of the heap.

To accomplish this, it is not necessary to assign a value to each variable, as most programs do. Commodore Basic allows you to establish variables in order, each with a value of 0, by using the DIM statement:

The above method usually works fine, but it includes a potentially fatal bug, since it can exit the For...Next loop without executing the Next. When such an exit is made, the computer's stack pointer is not restored to its proper value, and the chance of an Out Of Memory error is greatly increased. It is better to use something like this:

Location 198 contains the number of entries in the keyboard buffer. When no key is pressed, the loop sets T = T, then increments T; it finishes as soon as T = 500. As soon as a key is pressed, PEEK(198) = 1, setting T = 500. The loop is satisfied without corrupting the stack pointer.

If you begin line 100 with POKE 198,0 you will clear any previous keypresses before starting the delay loop. If you want to have the loop exit only when a certain key is pressed, you can do this:

If you're writing a program involving an RS-232 device, be sure to open your channel before setting any critical variables.

\$1BF Better printed listings—Commodore's 1526 printer has a little-understood paging mode that allows it to skip over the perforations between sheets of paper. With very little effort, you can use this feature to get nice top and bottom margins on your multiple listings.

To try it out, put a long Basic program in memory—one that takes more than a page to list on the printer. Align the paper in your printer so the top of the sheet is just barely under the two black rollers on the movable paper bail, and enter the following line in Direct mode. The title can be anything at all and, if you'd like, can be omitted.

Then watch as your printer makes a professional-quality listing. When the listing stops, don't advance the paper by hand. Instead, enter, in Direct mode:



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


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SHAPE UP

WITH YOUR C-64

Who would have thought five years ago that you might use a computer to balance your diet and improve your physical fitness? Now there are such programs for health-conscious adults. Some of them will analyze your current intake of vitamins and minerals, helping you to create a more balanced diet; others will help you develop your own exercise program.

Four programs are reviewed here: Total Health from PractiCorp, The Model Diet from Softsync, Aerobics from Spinnaker Corporation and C.A.T.O. (Computer-Assisted Training Optimizer) from Syntonic.

Total Health and The Model Diet are nutrition programs designed for people who want to lose weight and eat right. Aerobics and C.A.T.O. help you to improve your physical fitness by giving



Diet and exercise—that's what the doctor orders to keep you fit and trim. Here are reviews of two nutritional and two physical fitness programs that will help you watch your weight and stay lithe and limber.

you exercise programs that you can tailor to suit your own needs.

Total Health

After you've loaded your tape or disk, Total Health starts by asking you some questions. Are you male or female? Pregnant? Nursing? And on an activity level of 1-5 (with 1 being low), where do you stand? (The manual explains that a person on level 1 burns 250 calories per day, whereas an athlete on level 5 burns 1600 calories per day.) Next, you are asked how old you are, how much weight you want to lose and how quickly you want to lose it.

Then you're asked to input what you plan to eat today, from a selection of about 100 foods. (You can go through the entire menu to find the right foods, or you can press f1 for the start of the dairy group, f3 for the meat group, etc.)

The computer also breaks the food down into protein, carbohydrates, fat and sodium. For example, I learned the cup of milk that I had with my breakfast contained 8.5 grams of protein, 12 grams of carbohydrates, 8.6 grams of fat and 122 milligrams of sodium. As I entered the rest of my breakfast foods, the program gave me a running total of calories, carbohydrates and other nutrients at the top of my screen. When I'd finished, the computer told me I'd devoured 455 calories so far, and that I'd be allowed 1345 more calories for the day.


Depending upon whether you want to lose weight or maintain your current weight, the program gives you a recommended daily calorie allowance. By keeping a close watch on your daily intake of calories, vitamins, minerals and so on, you can maintain a healthy, balanced diet and still reach your desired weight.

You can create a file by saving your statistics to disk or tape, and then call up a graphics display on your screen. Bar graphs will illustrate exactly where you stand on the criteria of calories, carbohydrates, fats, sodium and the various food groups.

I have only two criticisms of Total Health. First, I would like a greater

selection of foods. Second, I wish I could print out my data, especially the graphs. Sure, I can save my data, but I'm limited to viewing it on the screen, and I'd like something in hardcopy to study and show to my friends. Yet overall, Total Health is helpful and easy to understand.

As the manual puts it, Total Health "won't lock the refrigerator door, or make saltless crackers taste like devil's food cake." Instead, it will "instruct you to eat more of one of the basic food groups and cut down on your intake of another." (PractiCorp, The Silk Mill, 44 Oak St., Newton Upper

The Model Diet

The Model Diet is a comprehensive weight-loss and nutrition program. The first of the seven menu options, Calculate Requirements, asks many questions. In addition to the usual height, weight, sex, etc., Model Diet also asks if you put salt on most foods. Do you exercise regularly? Do you smoke? Do you drink? Do you eat fruits and vegetables? Do you get colds easily? Do you

live in a big city? Do you get headaches frequently? Do you become tense easily?


The program supposedly uses your answers to compute your needed vitamin and mineral intake, but neither the manual nor the screen tells you *how* it does that. What if you *do* get a lot of headaches? You could have a vitamin deficiency, a sinus condition or maybe a brain tumor—who knows? A screen message giving you some possible reasons would have been helpful. You can also opt to use the government's recommended daily allowance of vitamins, which is provided in the program.

After you answer all the questions, the program compares your actual weight to a recommended weight. (Total Health asks you how much you want to weigh, while Model Diet tells you how much you should weigh, based upon a number of factors.) If you need to lose weight, the program reveals how long it will take by cutting your calories at a rate of 100 per day, then 200, on up to a maximum of 700 calories per day.

I like the capability of printing out information with this program. The printout gives a very detailed breakdown of your daily intake, showing the percentages of the recommended daily allowance of 12 vitamins and minerals as well as the percentages of your individualized amounts.

If you find that you're lacking in a certain area, the program can help by giving you valuable information. For example, if you're lacking in vitamin B₁, you can call up the vitamin and mineral information option and ask for vitamin B₁. You'll discover that beef, liver, lean pork and whole grains are foods that can build up your B₁ intake. You'll also learn that a deficiency of B₁ could cause gastrointestinal problems, decreased alertness and slower reflexes.

Model Diet offers an exhaustive listing of nearly 2000 food types, broken down into 16 categories. You can print out the whole food listing or a particular category. You can also en-



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ter your own items and their nutritional value. (Softsync, 14 East 34th St., New York, NY 10016. C-64/\$29.95 disk.)

Aerobics

Maybe you already have a well-balanced diet and what you really need is a good exercise program. According to their manual, Spinnaker's Aerobics disk is designed not only to "provide you with a total fitness program to relieve stress, provide flexibility and muscle tone, and increase endurance," but also to "help you get in touch with the way your body works." The program offers you a cute graphic of a woman in leotards, complete with sweatband, who bounces, jogs and exercises on your screen.

You can elect beginner, intermediate, advanced or "a la carte" exercises. (A la carte gives you a list of about 20 different exercise groups.) You start off with warm-up exercises (which you can skip, if you like). The aerobic exercises are next, then cool down exercises. You can spend 25 minutes on the program or up to an hour and a half—it's your choice.

Here's an example of a 3½-minute aerobics routine: 15 jogs, 15 hopscotches, 10 jumping jack twists, 10

side-to-sides, 10 criss-cross feet, 15 jogs and aerobic stretches.

You should be able to easily understand what the on-screen figure is doing, but in case you don't, written directions are provided at the bottom of the screen and in the manual. In the upper-left corner of the screen is a counter, which counts down the exercises as she (and you) finish each set. The whole program is explained thoroughly and explicitly. Sure, you can buy a videotape (for about \$20 more than this program) of your favorite movie star exercising, but then it would be the same old stuff every time. With the Aerobics program, you can customize and change it to your individual needs and time constraints.

Any criticisms? Each part of the program has its own music, but I quickly grew tired of it. (The manual says you can turn on your own stereo if you'd prefer, so they've obviously anticipated this objection.)

At first it felt awkward exercising with my computer, but so what? No one's around to laugh hysterically at me when I go through my paces. And the program is a whole lot cheaper than joining a health club, where you'll have to stick to its particular

regimen. (Spinnaker Software Corp., 215 First St., Cambridge, MA 02142. C-64/\$44.95 disk.)

C.A.T.O.

C.A.T.O. (Computer-Assisted Training Optimizer) was originally developed to help the U.S. Army evaluate its soldiers' physical fitness. This highly professional, very serious program includes a comprehensive notebook-sized manual with diagrams and descriptions of all exercises, as well as understandable directions for the whole program.

For the first-time user, the computer asks simple questions, such as your weight, height and sex. Do you want the 3-, 5- or 6-day workout schedule? (The program recommends that you start with the 3-day schedule.) Next you must input your measurements and determine your fitness, flexibility and strength. Several tests are given to determine your current level of fitness, including push-ups, pull-ups, sit-ups and other exercises. You'll also tell the computer which, if any, fitness equipment you have available to you. Then C.A.T.O. uses all this information to design your personal exercise program.

Once your exercise program has been designed, you can call up a screen display, which shows a hi-res graphic of a very well-toned man and woman flexing their muscles. No movement is shown, but the exercise name is shown, along with how many you should do and which muscles will benefit.

As you progress, you can call up the Graph mode and see a block display of your improvement. You can also select a nutrition option, which gives you dietary advice on calories, protein, carbohydrates, fat and fiber.

Over 100 exercises with varying levels of difficulty are included in this program, ranging from the isometric military press to jumping jacks and bench presses. There's something for everyone here.


C.A.T.O. is a detailed fitness program for the serious user. It's easy to use, very well documented and worth the price. (Syntonic Corp., 543 South Fourth West, Missoula, MT 59801. C-64/\$59.95 disk.)

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
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Looking for a new image? This article discusses the differences between television displays and video monitors, and poses the important questions you must ask.

WHAT YOU SEE IS WHAT YOU GET

Most Commodore computerists use the family television for their video output. While the screen display is usually good, such an arrangement can create problems. For example, if one family member wants to watch a television special and another wants to use the computer, the one television set can't accommodate both persons.

One solution might be to purchase a second television. Another solution might be to buy a monitor for use with the computer. Some monitors can even be used as televisions. If you're interested, stay tuned. You might even improve your image.

You'll See the Difference

The foremost reason for using a video monitor with your computer is because it provides a substantial improvement in the image. Once you understand the various ways an image is created on the screen, you will also understand why a monitor provides you with the best picture.

On a TV set, the broadcast signal is received by the antenna and fed into the set's circuitry. Through a rather complex series of interpretive steps, that signal is broken down into various components that provide color, image (raster/scanner) and au-

dio information, thus enabling you to see and hear what is currently being shown on a given channel. Because this signal is carrying so much information, it is *modulated* so that certain bands of it carry the audio portion, while others carry the video, and so on.

The audio/video circuitry of your Commodore computer produces a *composite* signal for the video, with a separate carrier for the audio portion. The video portion is further separated into *luma*, or light signals, and *chroma*, or color signals. In brief, these signals are ready to be accepted by a composite video monitor just the way they come from the computer. This form, however, is not acceptable to your home TV, which uses modulated signals.

Your C-64 or Plus/4 has a built-in radio frequency (RF) modulator to convert the A/V chip's output into a form more palatable for the TV to accept. On a VIC-20, the RF modulator is the external black box; its cable plugs into the VIC on one end and the TV switch box on the other.

So, a TV needs a modulated signal, while a monitor needs a composite signal. Some monitors also accept another type of signal known as RGB, which simply stands for red, green

and blue. Since Commodore computers do *not* put out this form of video signal, you should be aware that you *cannot* use a monitor that has RGB input only; you need a composite video (input signal) monitor.

Expressed in the simplest terms, a TV signal is modulated, or bounced. Because of this modulation and other factors, the signal often isn't at its purest.

Composite signals, on the other hand, are in a refined and pure form, with no bouncing. This permits a much cleaner signal that, in turn, generates the clearest picture. However, there's a bit more to it than just the type of signal.

A Resolution Revolution

A video image is composed of pixels. Look closely at your TV or monitor screen and you'll notice that the picture is composed of tiny dots, much like the dots in a newspaper photograph. These are the pixels.

Video *resolution*, or a picture's clarity, is measured in pixels; the more pixels, the better the resolution. Here's why.

The more closely the pixels are packed together, the more video information is displayed. This is particularly noticeable in images with

curves or lots of color combinations. Having more dots in a given area allows the curve to be smoother or the separation of the colors sharper and crisper. Where there are fewer pixels, the resulting picture may have image smear and/or color bleed.

Television sets have lower resolution than video monitors because the FCC has standards with which home televisions must comply. Included in these standards is the fixed number of pixels that will produce a certain resolution ratio. The broadcast signal must also comply with these standards. The resolution standard

for broadcast is on the low side because of the bouncing modulated signal. A composite signal carries much more video resolution (pixel) information than a modulated signal.

What to Look For

Just as there are black-and-white and color televisions, there are also monochrome and composite color monitors. With monochrome monitors, you have your pick of austere black-and-white, amber or green phosphor screens.

Black-and-white monitors are the least expensive. They're suited for applications where the displaying of text information is of primary importance. However, many users find that the harsh contrast of a black-and-white screen is hard on the eyes.

If you're going to be spending a lot of time at the screen, amber or green phosphor displays are easier on the eyes. Generally, the cost of an amber or green phosphor display is only about \$10-\$25 more than a comparable model with a black-and-white display. Owing to the lack of color in the image, however, they are poorly suited for color graphics or gaming applications.

Before I discuss color-composite monitors, let me say a few words about sound. Many of the inexpensive monochrome monitors don't have any built-in speaker, which means that you'll have a picture, but no sound!

When you shop for a monitor, make sure you check to see whether or not it has a speaker. If you buy one without a speaker, you'll have to jerry-rig the sound output to your home stereo or other such audio amplifier.

Another nice feature is an ear-phone jack, so you can plug in a pair of headphones and listen to your games' sounds without disturbing others.

Most low-end, "economy" monitors won't have a speaker or an ear-phone jack, so you might want to pay an extra ten bucks or so for a monitor that does offer these features.

A composite color monitor will provide your Commodore with the best possible video image. Only by using a high-resolution color monitor can you truly appreciate your Commodore's excellent colors and graphics capabilities. This especially holds true if you own one of Commodore's newest computers, the C-16 or the Plus/4, as they both offer 128-color capability.

In regard to signals: The color-

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
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CARDCO MT/1 MONITOR TUNER

Cardco, Inc. has just released an add-on tuner, for composite monitors, that will enable you to watch television on your monitor!

The MT/1 is color-coordinated to match the Commodore 1702 color monitor, and it carries the usual Cardco lifetime guarantee to the original owner. The suggested list price (as of this writing) is \$199.95.

The MT/1 comes with its own wireless remote-control unit. Hooking it up to your monitor is simple, as there are only three connections to be made: antenna, video and audio.

The antenna connection uses the familiar screw-on coax-type connector, while the video and audio ports use standard RCA jacks.

Another feature of the MT/1 is that it is ready to accept multiplex (stereo) broadcasts when the FCC gives clearance for this enhanced sound broadcast format.

A very convenient feature is the built-in power jack on the back of the MT/1. This allows you to plug the monitor into the tuner, rather than into a wall outlet. The advantage of using this setup is that the power to the monitor shuts off when you shut off the tuner.

The wireless remote-control unit is a compact, slim box with controls for channel selection, channel search up or down, volume, muting and on-off. The remote-control unit is powered by two AAA batteries, which should last for over one year with average use.

The MT/1's large LED indicators for channels can easily be read from across the room. Additionally, the unit is cable-ready, and there is a channel-conversion chart on the back of the remote unit.

The MT/1 offers an affordable modification to your high-resolution monitor. Some of you might prefer this setup to a color TV, as it provides a clearer picture.

composite signal may be combined and fed into the monitor with one cable, or it can be further defined into the chroma and luma signals mentioned earlier. While the combined signal is much better than that on a TV set, the defined chroma and luma setup is better yet.

The best of the composite color monitors will provide for combined composite video input or separate chroma and luma input, with a switch to select the mode. In either case, the audio signal should always be carried through its own cable.

Concerning size, is bigger better? Bear in mind that you'll probably be spending a lot of time staring at this screen, so be sure that you get one that can be comfortably viewed. I suggest a minimum of ten inches diagonally; larger, if you can afford it (most monitors are 12 or 13 inches).

What about the warranty? Remember that a monitor is really a high-performance TV screen without the tuner circuitry. Make sure that the manufacturer is willing to cover the unit for at least 90 days on parts and labor, as this is pretty much the industry standard. Also inquire about the serviceability of the unit; does the manufacturer offer servicing, or will you have to leave it in a repair shop for a few months while the parts are flown in from lower Tasmania? This is an important consideration that few buyers think about until the monitor develops a problem.

How to Decide?

Which one is best? This is a question you'll ultimately have to answer for yourself. The best way to decide is to compare the actual video displays of those monitors that interest you. If the store has a Commodore

64 hooked up, you may be able to use it for your comparisons.

It's a good idea to bring along software that you've used a lot, so you'll have a familiar image on which to base your comparison. Another aid in making your selection is the chart included with this article (see Table 1), which gives specifications for the various models.

Ultimately, however, your own eyes should be the judge, since they're going to have to live with your decisions.

I've been asked a number of times what I use for my own applications. I have one Commodore Model 1701 and two Model 1702 monitors in my setup. My choice was a fairly straightforward one, based on these factors: their screens are comfortably large; their color rendition and resolution are excellent; their inputs are switchable from combined composite video and audio to chroma, luma and audio; their warranty is standard; the color is compatible with my C-64; most of all, they're dependable.

The Commodore monitors in my studio are on for an average of 12 hours a day, often seven days a week. I have literally thousands of hours of use on them, and I've never had any trouble at all.

Oh, yes...the price is right, too! The local Kmart sells them for \$259—a really good price for this much monitor!

The Combination TV/Monitor

With the growing popularity of component video systems, we're starting to see more and more combination television/monitors in the stores.

By means of a switch, these units can change from a television to a hi-

res monitor that lets you animate sprites with your computer. While this does indeed give you the best possible means of using one video screen for two applications, it doesn't solve the problem of one person watching TV while another computes.

You can also watch TV on your monitor if you own a home video recorder. The VCR has its own built-in tuner and a pair of jacks for video-out and audio-out. If you connect these jacks to your monitor, you can use the monitor as a TV.

Of course, you'll need an antenna connected to the VCR tuner, but the output of these jacks is composite video, which, you'll remember, is the type of signal that the monitor can handle.

If you don't own a VCR or you're not interested in hooking it up to your monitor for TV reception, then check the sidebar on this article to find out more about Cardco's MT/1 Monitor Tuner unit.

The Chart

The accompanying chart (see Table 1) lists several of the most popular monitors with their important features. This chart isn't complete, but it provides a very good cross-section of what's available.

If you're interested in a monitor that isn't mentioned on this chart, you can still use the chart as a guide for comparing features and price.

I hope this article has given you a "clear picture" of what a monitor can do for you! [R]

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
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One Little Word After Another

Word Processing on the C-64

*Word processors for home computers
have made many a writer's life far easier.
Here are reviews of more than a dozen
available for the Commodore 64.*

Word processing is one of the most practical applications of the Commodore 64. Many people buy their C-64 system for the sole purpose of word processing. It is no wonder, then, that there are so many word processors on the market. This article will attempt to sort through the confusion and spotlight the better products. Also, it will indicate some products to avoid.

A Growing Phenomenon

Word processors make typewriters obsolete. That simple fact explains why the word processing phenomenon is taking over at the office and invading the home.

With a word processor, there is no such thing as correction fluid, ribbons or retyping. Entering and changing text is achieved through the editing process. The format of your printed document can be changed by pressing a few keys.

"How wonderful," you might be thinking, "but I never could learn all those complicated word processing commands." Put your fears aside. Welcome to the world of these user-friendly word processors. Many of these programs are so easy to learn that you can be off and running in fifteen minutes.

For Home and Office

Before you read the reviews, you should think about what you want in a word processor. The word processors reviewed here fall into two main categories: home use and professional use. Word processors for the home are usually easy to learn and

relatively cheap, but they lack advanced features. Professional programs have the advanced features, but some of them may be priced out of your range.

The chart accompanying this article compares the features of the word processors reviewed. Many of these features are defined below. If you're a beginner, you should become familiar with them. The chart and definitions will give you a good background in word processing terminology, and they may help you to decide what you need in such a program.

Editing Features

Cursor Movement. All of the word processors reviewed here make use of the cursor keys on the Commodore keyboard. The up and down keys are used to scroll through the text. Most of the programs allow you to jump from one section of text to another. Some even allow movement by one word, sentence or paragraph at a time, which can speed up editing.

Deletion. The real joy of word processing is that typographical errors can be corrected instantly with the press of a key before anything is ever printed on paper.

Block delete is a command that can be used to eliminate parts of sentences or even entire paragraphs with a few keystrokes. With some word processors, you can recall the deleted text if you change your mind.

Insertion. To make an insertion in existing text, you simply start typing at the desired location, and the program moves the rest of the text over to make room for the entry.

Block Moves. While editing your text, you may come upon a sentence or paragraph that would fit better somewhere else. With a word processor, it is just a matter of a few keystrokes to "cut" out what you want to move and "paste" it where you want it. Block copy allows for the duplication of what you "cut" anywhere in the document, as many times as you please.

Word Wrap. With word wrap, a word that will not fit at the end of a line is automatically carried down to the next line. This makes editing much easier, since there are no confusing word fragments on the left and right margins of your text.

Search and Replace. This has become a standard feature among the current word processors. With a search-and-replace function, you can search for a particular word or phrase and replace it with a new word or phrase wherever it may appear in the document.

Tabs. The Tab function works the same way as on a typewriter. It makes it easy to line up columns for tables and charts.

Column Manipulation. This capability is found only in the most powerful word processors. Once you have defined a column (a vertical row of names, numbers, etc.), you can move it to another place in the document, indent it, save it to disk or alphabetize it.

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
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
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
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Headers/Footers. When producing long documents, it is often desirable to have the chapter name or title on each page. Many word processors will do this for you automatically.

Automatic Pagination. Most of the programs reviewed will automatically place the page number at the top or bottom of the printed pages. If the word processor is capable of producing headers or footers, you can include the page number within them.

Justification. Everything on a typewriter is aligned on the left side. Some word processors can align the right side of the printed page as well, giving your document a more professional look.

Line Spacing. Single- and double-spacing has become a standard in these word processors. Some offer triple-spacing and more.

Centering. If you have ever had to manually center a line on a typewriter (i.e., count the letters, divide by two and count backwards from the center), you will appreciate the automatic centering capability of many word processors.

Indentation. If you neglected to indent your paragraphs while writing, most word processors can do it for you automatically when printing.

Widow and Orphan Control. When you come to the end of a printed page, you don't want to have one line of a new paragraph at the end of a page (an "orphan") or the last line of a paragraph at the top of a new page (a "widow"). Some programs can watch out for this and automatically prevent it from happening.

Change Pitch. Pitch refers to the number of characters per inch on your printed document. Many printers will allow you to condense or expand the spacing between letters by altering the pitch settings; some word processors allow you to access this capability.

Preview. This should be a standard feature, but is far from it. Preview allows you to examine the way the printed page will look before you print it, thus eliminating the need for a trial printing. Word processors accomplish this by one of three methods: by reducing the size of each character by one-half to make an 80-column preview screen; by keeping the normal 40 columns and using horizontal scrolling, or by having a pixel representation of the printed page (characters are reduced to dots), giving you a general idea of what it will look like.

Character Enhancements. If your printer is capable of producing italics, boldface, subscripts, superscripts and underlining, then you will want a word processor that is capable of utilizing these features.

Default Values. Instead of having to set all the printing format features every time you want to print a page, most of the programs have preset values that you can use.

Multiple Copies. If you want to have a hundred copies of the same document printed, this feature saves you from having to go through the Print command a hundred times.

Form Letters. While this is a task better suited to a database and word processor combination, some word processors have the ability to produce the same document with different names and addresses. This involves first creating a file of names and addresses, then a document with variable blocks, or holes, where the varying information is to be placed.

Force Page. This forces the next part of the document to appear on a new page.

File Size. An important aspect to compare among word processors is the amount of text that can be in memory at one time. When you reach the end of text memory, you have to start a new file.

Linking Files. This feature allows you to link and print separate files.

Hyphenation. The automatic word wrap may leave your right margin very ragged. Some word processors will allow you to hyphenate words. The only way you'll know if a word needs to be hyphenated is to either preview the document or do a trial print run.

Disk Commands. With most word processors, you can Catalog, Format, Scratch and Rename from within the program.

On to the Reviews

The 13 word processing programs reviewed here are all currently available for the Commodore 64. While there are several others on the market, the following programs provide a good sampling of what is available.

Bank Street Writer

Bank Street Writer (Broderbund Software) is characterized by ease of use. There are no complicated commands here; everything is menu driven. The documentation is good, but rather unnecessary, since the menus are self-explanatory. There is a tutorial included on the disk that takes you through the program step by step.

Editing. The problem with this program is that in order to move the cursor or execute any command, you must enter the Edit mode. If you make an error while entering text, you must leave the Write mode, enter the Edit mode, move the cursor, then re-enter the Write mode. While this is not a major problem, it does slow you down.

In the Edit mode, you work through menus at the top of the screen to reach all the commands. This approach ensures that you'll never forget a command, since they are all listed on the screen. This makes the program easy to learn, but it also makes accessing commands rather slow compared to some other programs.

Print Formatting. Lack of any form of print preview means that you have to do a trial print run to see what the document will look like. Bank Street Writer does have a rough-draft function for this purpose, but a preview function would have been preferable. The print formatting commands are all listed on a menu, so there aren't any imbedded printer commands to learn. The lack of character-enhancement capabilities will frustrate the owners of printers that include these features.

Summary. Bank Street Writer is best suited for home use. It has been extensively tested in the academic environment, and it is ideal for students who want to learn word processing. Those who need a faster, more powerful word processor can do better.

Cut & Paste


Cut & Paste (Electronic Arts) is a very easy-to-learn program. The packaging and manual have a great emphasis on style, making it a friendly introduction to word processing. The package includes a document disk, which is a nice extra. A reference card is also included.

Editing. Cut & Paste is awkward in a few areas. If you want to simply type over a misspelled word, you must first mark the word by pressing CTRL-A, then move the cursor to highlight the word, and then make the correction. The cut-and-paste procedure (block move), for which the program is named, is more easily accomplished. It is done by marking the text as explained before, and pressing CTRL-C (for cut). The text that was marked then goes into the buffer. Move the cursor to where you want the text in the buffer to appear, press CTRL-P for paste, and it's there. The tab function is preset to five

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
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spaces, and it cannot be changed.

Print Formatting. Cut & Paste is lacking in this area, for there is no print preview, character enhancements, justification or centering.

Summary. Cut & Paste is an easy-to-learn, friendly word processor. However, its lack of some important printing features and its limited, sometimes awkward editing procedures prevent it from being a serious, professional package.

Creative Writer

Creative Writer (Creative Software) is amazingly easy to learn and

use. An extensive Help menu, containing all of the program's functions, can be accessed by pressing f3. The Main menu, from which you can select the printing, formatting and writing options, is clear and concise and can be accessed at any time by pressing f7.

Editing. Commands are executed by pressing f1 first, then making a minimum of keystrokes. For example, if you want to delete a paragraph, you press f1 to enter the Command mode, then the delete key for deletion, and then the P key, for paragraph. Creative Writer has a lot of

features not found in many programs designed for home use (e.g., word wrap, tabs and widow- and orphan-control).

Print Formatting. Print previewing is done with a pixel representation of the printed page. Formatting is done through a simple, but complete, menu, thus eliminating confusing embedded commands. My only complaint is the lack of character enhancements—you can't underline, italicize or use other special features.

Summary. For home use, I recommend this program above all others. Creative Writer is easy to learn and use. It is powerful, yet clear and simple enough for the beginner.

Paperclip

Paperclip (Batteries Included) is one of the best professional word processors available for the Commodore 64. It has a multitude of features, yet it is still easy to use. Paperclip is dongle-protected, meaning that there is a plastic (dongle) plug that fits into the joystick port; this must be inserted to run the program. While this may seem like a nuisance, it means that the program itself is unprotected, allowing you to make backup copies.

Editing. Every command is accessed through the control key. An example of this program's thoroughness is its search-and-replace function. When you search for a word, you can search for the exact word, use wild cards (searching for "eve*" finds both "ever" and "even"), or match a letter combination at the beginning or end of a word. My only complaint with Paperclip is that it lacks word wrap, making text very difficult to read.

Print Formatting. The newest version of Paperclip, 64D, includes an 80-column print preview. On the disk are files for all the popular printers, which you can load quickly from inside the program. With this information, Paperclip has total printer control. Printer commands are all embedded, so there are no menus at all in Paperclip, just the Editing mode. The embedded commands are just as complete as the editing features.

Summary. Paperclip is an excellent professional word processor. I could not find anything that it lacked, except for word wrap. I recommend it highly for the professional category.

Homeword

Sierra's Homeword is extremely simple to learn. The package in-

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
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cludes an audio cassette with a tutorial on how to use the program. This tutorial, however, is painfully slow and overly simplistic (assuming that you already know how to turn on your computer and put a disk in the drive). The package also includes a reference card that repeats the information contained in the five most important pages of the manual.

Editing. Homeword is menu-driven through icons. In other words, the menu cursor is a large square that you place around a little picture (icon) of what you want to do. If you want to load a file, move the cursor to the picture of the file cabinet. If you want to justify the document, put the cursor around the layout icon and press the return key; then, in the Layout menu, select the picture of the justified document.

Print Formatting. In the Editing mode, a pixel representation of the printed page appears in the lower right-hand corner of your screen. There is also an 80-column preview in the Print mode. When you enter the Print mode, the program loads more data from the disk. Switching between the Main menu and the Print menu is a time-consuming process. Only the basic formatting commands are found in Homeword.

Summary. Homeword is very easy to learn, but not so easy to use. If you're a novice with a slight case of computerphobia, Homeword will serve as a painless introduction to word processing. However, users who need a sophisticated word processor may find this one to be too slow to suit their needs.

Blitztext

Blitztext (Elcomp Publishing) is a very confusing word processor with an equally confusing manual.

Editing. With virtually every other word processor on the market, you do not have to press the return key when you come to the end of a line. This is one of the joys of word processing that Blitztext has left out.

Print Formatting. Printing a document is a good example of the confusion and inconvenience involved with using Blitztext. To print your text, you press CTRL-A, type "M47", and then press CTRL-A twice. Makes a lot of sense, doesn't it?

Summary. Blitztext lacks any redeeming qualities, and I see no purpose in considering it, even for occasional home use.

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Word Writer

Word Writer (Timeworks, Inc.) is another good, but not outstanding, word processor for home use. It comes with two keyboard overlays, to be placed above the numbers row and next to the function keys. These overlays are the backbone of the program. The documentation only briefly explains the use of each function. Half of the manual is dedicated to the use of Data Manager, Timeworks' database, in conjunction with Word Writer.

Editing. All the commands are ac-

cessed by a combination of the Commodore or control key and a key on the top row of the keyboard. Block moves are done by marking the beginning of the block with Commodore-1, the end of the block with Commodore-2 and moving or copying it to another location in the document with Commodore-3. Inserting text is not automatic (there is no Insert mode), so the only way to insert text is by first inserting lines and later closing up the gaps by using the delete key.

Print Formatting. Only the basic printing features are found in Word



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Writer—there are no preview, character enhancement or any other advanced features.

Summary. Word Writer would be much too confusing for a beginner, especially with the poor manual. It lacks printing features, and it can be difficult to use; it has little to offer compared with some of the others in the home use category.

Totl.Writer

Totl.Writer (Totl Software, Inc.), unlike its predecessor, Totl.Text 2.6, ranks among the professional word processors. It has an extensive array of features. A complete Help menu can be accessed by the press of a function key.

Editing. Cursor movement can be done by word, sentence or paragraph by pressing CTRL-W, CTRL-S or CTRL-P, respectively. Block moves involve a long series of prompts. To delete a block, you first press f8 to get at the block commands, then press D (for delete). Then you are prompted to move the cursor to the beginning of the text to be deleted and press the return key, then to move to the end of the block and press the return key again. Then you are asked if you *really* want to delete

the block. (Would you have gone through all that if you weren't serious?) Block copies are even more tedious; you are prompted three times to see if it is all right to go on.

Print Formatting. Totl.Writer has an enormous list of formatting capabilities. All commands are embedded. One feature that I found in no other word processor was true embedded footnoting. The program automatically places the footnote at the bottom of the page where the footnoted passage occurs.

Summary. Totl.Writer is a very impressive program and well worth considering for professional use.

WordPro 64

WordPro 64 (Pro-Line Software, Ltd.) is an excellent professional word processor with an identity crisis. The official name of this program is currently being decided in court, but I will use WordPro 64 for this review. Whatever you want to call it, this word processor has a myriad of features and is easy to use. The documentation is a little tough to follow at times, but it covers the program adequately.

Editing. Block moves are done through a combination of the Com-

modore key and another key that represents that particular function. For example, Commodore-D enters the Block Delete command. Pressing W, S or P highlights a word, sentence or paragraph, respectively. Then, press the return key and the highlighted text is deleted. The scrolling speed of the cursor up and down keys can be increased by first pressing f1.

Print Formatting. This is where WordPro 64 really shines. Print preview can be done either by 40-column horizontal scrolling or by pixel representation. Extensive printer files on disk are utilized to take full advantage of your printer. The formatting commands are embedded, and they're very thorough. A header or footer can appear on the left, middle or right side of the printed page.


WordPro 64 can also produce double columns. (I found this feature on only one other word processor—CGRS Microtech's Copy-Writer. However, WordPro 64 costs less and does more.) Double columns on a printed page would be suitable for newsletters, pamphlets and brochures. It is utilized by an embedded command (dc) followed by the value of the column width.

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
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this program is proportional spacing between letters. Quite a few printers are capable of this, and WordPro 64 will allow you to access it.

Summary. WordPro 64 rivals the best of the professional word processors, and I would rate it a "best buy." It has good editing features and an incredible list of printing features.

Word Commander 64

Word Commander 64 (MMG Micro Software) is a rather run-of-the-mill word processor for home use. It is not very friendly, nor is it easy to learn. You must first make a printer file through Basic (on disk) from outside the program. This could be disastrous if you are not familiar with Basic, and the poor documentation doesn't make it any easier.

Editing. While Word Commander 64 has many features, the editing commands are not easy to execute. Blocks are deleted, moved or copied by first marking them with Commodore-X at both ends (the text does not become highlighted), and then pressing CTRL-K to delete the text.

Print Formatting. Preview is done by horizontal scrolling, which takes away from text memory. All printer commands are embedded.

Summary. This is a rather mediocre word processor. Word Commander 64 is not a bad program, but there are better ones on the market for the same price.

Textomat 64

Abacus Software's Textomat 64 is a new, completely menu-driven word processor. You reach almost every editing command through an extensive series of menus. This approach will enable you to learn Textomat 64 in a very short time, but it may become rather tedious to continually wade through all the menus. The documentation is very thorough and easy to read.

Editing. You can move through the text quickly by using cursor jumps (by the word). Pressing f3 moves the cursor forward one word; pressing f4 moves it backward one word. This is much faster than just using the cursor-right key to move across a line.

A major problem with Textomat is really a simple thing—the delete key. Unless you type perfectly, you are going to make errors. Correcting typos should be as simple as pressing the delete key. You cannot do this with Textomat 64. The delete key deletes the character under the cur-

sor, not the character immediately to the left of it. Therefore, you must back up using the cursor-left key and then delete the error. I found that this slowed me down considerably while typing.

Block moves involve going through a series of menus, which is helpful at first, making it almost impossible to forget the command. However, once you learn it, you will wish that there were a faster way to do it. All the editing, printing and disk controls are accessed through these menus.

Print Formatting. Textomat 64 has print preview and most of the standard print-formatting capabilities. These features are controlled mainly through a format menu.

Summary. Textomat 64 is suited for home use, but it is too slow to meet the demands of professionals.

Copy-Writer


Copy-Writer (CGRS Microtech) is a program that might scare a beginner away from word processing. Before you can use Copy-Writer, you must create a new version of the program, customizing it for your particular printer—a process I found quite confusing. The documentation,

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which came to me unbound, is not much help.

Editing. Editing capabilities are minimal with Copy-Writer. The cursor disappears when it is moved, making editing unnecessarily confusing. There's no Insert mode; you're limited to the insert key.

Block moves are accomplished by deleting the text, character by character, into a buffer, and then dumping the buffer at the appropriate spot. All commands are entered on a separate prompt line at the bottom of the screen. To search for a word, you

press the run/stop key to enter the prompt line, then type *c/word/* and press the return key. As with Textomat 64, the delete key does not work as it does in Basic, which means that correcting errors can be a tedious process.

Print Formatting. CGRS Microtech's advertising for Copy-Writer emphasizes its double-column capability. This means the program can produce two columns on the same page without negative line feeds (the printer moving the paper backward). This is an impressive feature. All the other

standard printing features are also included.

Summary. Copy-Writer's best feature is its double-column capability. However, if you really need double columns, then I recommend WordPro 64.

you would expect Fleet System 2 to be something special. It is.

Fleet System 2 is a very professional, easy-to-use program. It includes a fast, 70,000-word spelling checker on the back side of the disk. Unfortunately, the documentation is not as good as it could be. A reference card is also included in the package.

Editing. Fleet System 2 is almost exactly like Paperclip in terms of editing commands. In fact, I found it hard to make a distinction between the two programs. However, Fleet System 2 makes better use of the function keys,

which are used to enter the Insert and Shift Lock modes.

Deleting a block of text involves pressing fl, then D (for delete), and then W or S to highlight words or sentences. Pressing the return key then deletes the highlighted text. One thing that I dislike about Fleet System 2 is that moving and copying blocks can only be done by entire screen lines, not by words or sentences.

Print Formatting. Fleet System 2 has all the formatting commands that you'd expect in a professional word processor. All the commands are

embedded in the text. Again, it is difficult to distinguish between this program and Paperclip.

Summary. Fleet System 2 is an excellent word processor with a fast spelling checker. If you are looking for a professional program, you should definitely consider this one. ®

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
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RENUMBERER

A Remedy for Poor Planning

*Here's a handy utility program
that will take the drudgery out of renumbering
your program's lines.*

By ALEJANDRO A. KAPAUAN

Renumbering a program can be a time-consuming and tedious task, especially if your program contains several On...Goto and On...Gosub statements.

The disk-based Basic File Renumber program will read in a Basic program and rewrite the new, renumbered program. Unlike the renumbered commands of some programmer's aids, Basic File Renumber will automatically adjust all line numbers following statements such as Gosub, Goto and If...Then. Since this program renumbers from file to file, owners of VIC-20s with very limited memory can renumber even very large programs.

Besides renumbering, Basic File Renumber can also generate a cross reference of line numbers for your renumbered program. This cross reference provides a list of line numbers that are mentioned in other lines and shows where they occur.

You also might want to use Basic File Renumber to change the line numbers of existing programs or program modules so that you can easily merge them with your own programs (see John Olsen's article "Mix and Match Programs on the C-64" in *RUN*, April 1984).

Typing In the Program

The program is found in Listing 1. The DIM statement in line 100 allows the utility to renumber programs of up to 300 lines in length (I chose this number arbitrarily). As is, the program uses more than 3580 bytes, so if you're using an unexpanded VIC-20, reduce the value of MX in line 100 to about 150. An unexpanded VIC can renumber a program of 150 lines, but it won't have enough memory to generate the cross-reference listing.

If you use either a VIC with at least 8K expansion or a Commodore 64, you may leave the value of MX at 300. If you have sufficient memory, you may increase this number to renumber longer programs. To improve screen formatting of the cross-reference table, VIC owners can change the 40 in line 610 to 22.

Type in the program carefully. Pay attention to the semicolons in the Print# statements. Remember, you cannot use the Print statement's abbreviation (?) for the Print# statement. If you do, you'll get Syntax errors when you run the program. To speed up disk reads, the data in lines 720 and 730 constitute a short

machine language program, which is Poked into the cassette buffer. Be careful in entering the data. After typing and proofreading the program, save it to disk before you attempt to run it.

Using the Utility

To use Basic File Renumber, load it into your computer and run it. Insert into your disk drive the disk that contains the program you wish to renumber. The program will ask you for the name of the input file and the name you wish to give the renumbered file. It will then ask you for the starting line number and the increment by which to renumber the program. You will also be asked if you want a cross reference of the program.


The file will be scanned in a first pass to determine what line numbers it contains. On the second, slower pass, it will renumber your program's lines. The second pass will be slower because each line must be decoded to determine if it contains line number references that need to be changed. Also, both reads and writes to the disk will be taking place, which slows down the operation of the program.

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
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at all, then you've made an error in typing in Listing 1. Check your work, and make the necessary corrections to the program. You may then scratch the mangled renumbered file from your disk and try again. R

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
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
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

Update: Regarding the lockup problems when using the 801 printer with the VIC, as reported in the November 1984 Commodore Clinic, there is a perfect fix. Right after turning on the VIC, type:

POKE 37160,0:POKE 37161,1

This completely solves the problem of the 801 locking up.

As you know, the VIC feeds data down the serial bus faster than the 64. This sometimes causes the 801 to get confused. The Pokes adjust the internal timers of the VIC to properly "handshake" with the 801.

PROGRAMMING

Q: Is there a way to put a hidden password in the title of a program on disk, so only people who know the password can load the program?

A: Yes, some programs do this already. The technique is to include characters in the filename that aren't what they appear to be when printed. For instance, if the name of your program is "bell," you could protect it by saving it this way:

SAVE "0:

Then, before typing the name, hold down the shift key while you press the space bar. This makes a shifted-space character, also known as CHR\$(160). It will look just like an ordinary space character when you type it in, but will change the appearance of that line of the disk directory in a way you'll have to see to believe—definitely different enough to fool

Q: I haven't been able to find anything on why and what you can do with disk drives #8 and #9. Can you explain, please? I'm in trouble!

I changed device 8 to 9, then found I can't use it with several programs that recognize only 8. Commodore is no help—they sent me a one-line note: "Change it back!" The program to change the device number via software doesn't seem to work to make 9 into 8 again. Should I make the hardware change back? Why make the change in the first place?

A: Either change it back or add a single-pole single-throw switch across the solder pad you cut to make it device 9. The switch will let it be 8 or 9 as needed. But I can't imagine why you would want a 1541 to be anything other than device 8 if you don't own any other disk drives. As you noticed already, device 8 is standard.

If you have a 4040 or larger disk unit, change the first value in line 130 to CHR\$(12) instead of CHR\$(119).

The reason for changing a disk's device number is so you can use more than one disk unit connected to the same computer. Each device needs its own address (device number) to avoid confusion, just as each person needs an individual name.

With two disk drives connected at once and set to different device numbers, you have twice as much storage space immediately available. In practice, this usually means that one holds programs, while the other holds data files, or one makes backup copies of the other's files.

If you need this capability, consider buying a second disk drive or, better yet, a dual disk drive (one with two drives in a single cabinet).

Q: I have to open several relative files, but after opening the sixteenth file, I get a Disk Full error message. What am I doing wrong?

A: I know of two ways to fill a disk. One is by creating more than 144 files, which you have *not* done, based on the track and sector dump you enclosed.

The other is by creating some files that are large enough to use up all the available space. This is apparently what you've done, although I can't be sure without seeing the disk.

Even one file can overload a disk if it is a relative file and you write to a large enough record number within it. If this has happened, either choose a smaller record size or use fewer records in your files.

Also remember that only one relative file can be open on the 1541 at any one time. To use more, access them one after the other, closing the last one before opening the next.

Q: Occasionally, when I attempt to format a disk on my 1541, my disk drive cranks for a minute or so and then the red light comes on, indicating an error. When I attempt to list the disk's directory, I receive only garbage. When I attempt to format the disk again, the drive sometimes produces the same error and sometimes formats the disk properly. Do you know why this occurs?

A: You've just described a typical disk failure when formatting. Such a failure usually means either that the disk wasn't seated properly in the drive when you tried to format it or that the disk is faulty.

If you succeed in formatting the disk on your second try, after removing and inserting the disk again, you probably don't have anything to worry about. If a second try also fails, I would return the disk for a replacement (the disks I use are guaranteed for life).

However, you still have one more option: Use a bulk eraser (a big magnet) on the disk and then try to format it one more time. Friends who do this claim it often works.

Q: My 64 and 1541 lock up when I use the Validate command on a particular disk that is nearly full (five blocks free). After a few moments, the drive head movements stop and the drive runs indefinitely with the activity light on.

How can I correct this problem, and what is the safest way to get out of a lockup situation like this? The drive will not respond to any commands, including UJ.

A: Most likely there is something wrong with that disk. Immediately copy (not duplicate) all its files onto a freshly formatted disk. (This is easiest to do on a dual drive, if you know someone who has one.) When you do this, you may discover some files are ruined and can't be copied, or that they can be copied, but have been altered somehow.

After all the files have been rescued, you may reformat the original troublesome disk, which will probably be all right from then on. If not, get rid of it.

As for how to get out of a disk lockup, it depends on whether the drive is reading or writing. If it is only reading a disk, no harm is done by removing the disk even when the drive-activity light is on.

On the other hand, if the drive is writing, removing the disk or turning off the computer or drive could mean lost data. After waiting long enough to be sure the computer wasn't taking time out for garbage collection, and that the drive isn't simply busy on a long slow task, the safest recovery method is to open and then close the command channel by entering:

```
OPEN 15,8,15:CLOSE 15
```

This safely closes all disk files. If the drive ignores this command, you will have to reset the computer or remove the disk—but please don't turn off the drive with the disk still in it. Odds are you'll lose some data, but it's too late to avoid that. If the information you lose is very important, there are sometimes ways to restore it. People like me do that work for a fee.

Q: I have a problem saving part of a program as it is entered, for safety, and then saving more of it under the same name later. Is there a way to append data to a program without renaming it?

A: Sorry, the Disk-append option only works on datafiles, not programs. You could use the Save With Replace option when saving revised versions of a program, but it's better not to erase old copies of uncompleted programs until the finished program is thoroughly tested. This is in case something goes wrong with the latest version, and you have to go back to an older version.

When I start a new program, I put it on a blank disk, saving up to several dozen versions of the program with a slightly larger number at the end of the name each time I save it. This

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continues until I finish the project. Then I copy the finished version to another disk. Finally, I reformat the project disk before using it on another project.

Q: How can I salvage a program I spent 12 hours working on? I have a monitor, so I can see the program in memory. But if I try to list, it starts out okay but later looks like garbage. When I get to certain points, the screen freaks out, turns black and makes little shapes in the corner. What is going on, and can I salvage some of this program by resetting something?

A: The easiest way to restore a program is from a backup copy you made before the disaster. When I am writing a new program, I save a copy to disk every 20 minutes, each with a different version number, ending up with a disk full of ever newer and more complete programs. I also save a final copy before I type RUN the first time. This avoids 99% of the problems you mention.

Unfortunately, it could easily take more than 12 hours to salvage your lost work. You should use a machine language monitor to be sure all the link pointers in the Basic program are pointing in their proper directions.

This is tedious work at best, and not for newcomers. If you know which line number is the first one that gives trouble and have a monitor that can convert its value into hex, you may be able to use some monitors' .H command to find that line quickly.

The link pointer is made up of the first two bytes in each line of Basic, and the first one is normally pointed to by locations \$2B-2C in the VIC and 64. Once you've repaired the program, be sure it ends with three \$00 bytes in a row and that locations \$2D-2E point one location beyond the last \$00. Then, save your work, return to Basic, type CLR, save again and try listing the result.

It isn't a job for the faint of heart. You can read more about what's going on in the "Inside and Beyond

Basic" chapter of my book, *PET Personal Computer Guide*, from Osborn/McGraw-Hill.

Q: I would love to find a book that would explain in very simple terms how to write subscripts and superscripts on my Prowriter 8510.

Q: I didn't know my Prowriter could do super/subscripts. If you could note the codes down for me, I would be most appreciative.

A: To print subscripts and superscripts on the C. Itoh Prowriter 8510 (and many other printers), you must be able to change the number of vertical lines per inch.

Normally, there are six printed lines per inch. But if you change the printer to print 18 lines per inch, you can divide each line of text into three lines in the printout—one for superscripts, one for ordinary text and one for subscripts. The following steps are needed:

- set the lines printed per inch to 18 instead of the usual 6
- print the superscript characters
- print the regular characters
- print the subscript characters
- set the lines printed per inch to 6 again

The way this procedure is accomplished will vary somewhat from one brand of printer to another. You can probably find the needed codes in your printer's manual.

When using the Prowriter 8510, the code to select this action is an escape code. These are codes that start with CHR\$(27), the ASCII escape character, followed by one or more other CHR\$() values. Here are the commands:

One other complication could be your printer interface. Be sure it is set so as not to alter these codes on the way to the printer (usually called Transparent mode).

Now that you know how to do superscripts and subscripts, you can use the same approach to use the other special commands built into your printer. Just remember that, whereas most Basics control printers with Lprint commands, PET Basic uses Print# commands instead, as shown above.

SOFTWARE

Q: Is it better to buy commercial software on disk or cartridge? What are the advantages and disadvantages of each?

A: Disks are more common, partly because they are usually about \$5 cheaper than an equivalent cartridge, but also because they can be updated more easily and don't require changing any hardware connections when going from one program to another.

On the other hand, cartridges are far more durable than disk, cannot damage your disk drive and start instantly.

As copy-protection schemes have grown ever more elaborate and fragile, I have come to prefer cartridge versions of programs that cannot easily be copied, especially for use by kids and unskilled users.

On the other hand, constant insertion and removal of cartridges can eventually wear out the contacts on the cartridge port, so no one answer is perfect for everyone.

Q: I have a 64, a 1541 and a Gemini 10X printer. I have been able to customize the Armenian alphabet on the 64 and download it to the Gemini 10X. These programs will be used by a local church to send out their monthly mailings. Is there a word processor that will accept the customized alphabet?

A: Paperclip 64, from Batteries Included (Toronto, Ontario), includes the ability to load custom character sets into the 64. You would still load the custom character set into the printer first, before starting Paper Clip.

Another possible solution is the WordPro 64, for the Commodore 64, from Pro Line Software, Mississauga, Ontario. It allows you to define ten special characters for both the screen and the printer.

While we're on the subject of churches, one of my recent projects has been helping friends complete a long-needed church package for the 64. It is scheduled for release this month. I'd be glad to send any church more information about it, and about a helpful user's group for churches, the Church Computer Users' Network.

Q: A good majority of the programs on the market are written in the U.S.A. Those of us in Canada find this quite frustrating. Some programs may take a year or longer before they hit the Canadian market, if they hit it at all. Surely there must be a way to obtain these programs from the States. Is there any way you know of,

with a minimum of hassles, to purchase programs across the border?

A: Funny you should mention that. Sometimes I have the same feeling, except in my version all the good programs are written in Ontario, home of both word processing programs mentioned in the previous question. Maybe the grass really is greener on the other side!

As a Canadian once explained to me, the problem with getting new products to Canada quickly is that the population, and thus the market, is smaller than in the U.S. Also, products sold there must have bilingual boxes and manuals. A representative for a U.S. calculator maker reportedly claimed he could sell more calculators in Chicago alone than in all of Canada and avoid the hassle of changing the product.

It may not work quite the same way for you, but when I need to buy something from Canada, I either wait until my annual trip to Toronto, or order by mail. In both cases, I use a credit card to pay for the item. (Let the bank worry about exchange rates!)

Up to a cash value of \$250 or so, customs duties on orders shipped into the U.S. may be paid at the nearest post office. Up to about \$400 worth can be brought in each year duty-free by tourists returning from Canada. The duties on many computer products coming into the U.S. are quite low in any case.

The duty rates and customs procedures will differ in Canada, but you should be able to get details through your post office or by writing to the appropriate government agency. You could also find a dealer with a U.S. branch, such as Canadian Micro Distributors, in Milton, Ontario. Or visit scenic Niagara Falls, NY and buy direct.

Q: In testing a 1541 disk drive with the demo disk provided, I ran the performance test program and received a number of unit-is-failing-performance-test messages. A copy

of the test printout is enclosed. Is the drive defective?

A: Probably not. As the message at the start of the performance test indicates, you are only supposed to run it on a "scratch" disk (a disk that does not contain any valuable information), not the Test/Demo disk itself. Fortunately, you left on the write-protect tab; if you hadn't, the whole disk would have been erased by the test. (I can't be positive about your procedure, but I ran the Test/Demo disk with the write-protect tab attached and exactly duplicated your test printout.)

Before worrying about the drive, try running the program again, using a new or reusable disk instead of the Test/Demo disk. The program called it a scratch disk because its contents, if any, can be safely scratched (erased). Be sure its write-protect notch is not covered by anything.

HARDWARE

Q: I'm having a problem with a recently purchased VIC-Modem 1600. I am unable to log onto CompuServe. The indicator light on the modem does not go on, and I am not getting the prompt from CompuServe. The modular phone I have has the dial built into the handset. Is there a problem with the modem?

A: The problem is probably in your phone having its dial in the handset. Try using the modem with a standard Series 500 Western Electric desk phone, one with its smarts in the base and a detachable handset.

Get someone to assist you who has already called CompuServe and knows how to log on when the equipment works as it should. If you don't have that kind of phone available, it may be less expensive for you to trade in the 1600 on a 1650 Auto-Modem than to buy another phone.

Theoretically, you can also order a direct-connect cable for the 1600 from Commodore for about \$15, but I've never actually seen one.

Q: I live in a rural area that does not have touch-tone telephone service. Is there any way to get on-line that is pulse dial and then emulate the tones to access computer service?

A: I live in an area without tone dialing, too, but you're luckier than we are. Even pulse dialing fails sometimes here. If you need both pulse and tone dialing, some phones now have both methods built in.

This allows you to use pulse to dial out of town and then use tones to access All Net or other services that require it. One such phone is the Thinfone, from TeleConcepts, Inc. (22 Culbro Drive, West Hartford, CT 06110).

However, you won't need pulse plus tone dialing just to go on-line. The tones used by a telephone modem are different from those used to dial a touch-tone phone. As long as your phone system allows you to converse easily with persons in other towns, it is good enough to support the use of a modem.

If you have doubts about the quality of your service, use a 300-baud modem rather than the faster but more sensitive 1200-baud type. If having both tone and pulse dialing is important to you, some modems now include both in built-in autodialers.

Q: I have searched everywhere trying to find information about modems. At this time, I think my needs are for a modem that has 300 and 1200 baud. I want to be able to up and download and communicate with another 64, a VIC and a TRS-80 CoCo. What kind of program would I need to achieve the above results?

A: My own 300/1200-baud modem is the Signalman Mark XII, from Anchor Automation, the same com-

pany that makes the 1600 and 1650 modems for Commodore. As far as I know, it's still the least expensive 1200-baud modem able to emulate the popular Hayes Smart-Modem 1200. A friend who is an engineer in the industry pronounced it a bit weaker in design than his Hayes, but both work well.

To use either, you'll also need a VIC 1011-A RS-232 interface or equivalent. I rated and described two programs that you may use with this combination of equipment in my article on terminal programs in the September 1984 issue of *RUN*. They are VIDTEX, sold by CompuServe and Commodore, and VIP Term, from Softlaw (132 Aero Camino, Goleta, CA 93117).

Also keep an eye on Commodore. I expect a 1200-baud modem announcement from them soon.

Q: I don't understand the theory behind surge protectors. Why can't you plug an \$8 surge suppressor into an outlet and a multiple outlet into the surge protector? Would this not accomplish the same thing as using the Lemon, Lime and Orange brand of surge suppressors?

A: Fancy surge protectors provide two services. First, they provide some protection against surges of moderately high voltage, just like your \$8 version. Second, they also provide filtering of more ordinary variations in voltage, damping down deviations from the standard voltage and frequency. A water heater is a good analogy for the way this works.

A water heater's size allows it to hold enough water to give a comfortably warm shower. Even though cold water is constantly entering the tank as you bathe, the water doesn't normally leave the tank until it has been warmed. On the other hand, if the water were ever to boil, a separate emergency valve would open, to give steam an escape route and prevent an explosion.

In a surge protector, the surge protection is like the emergency valve, and the filtering is like the water tank.

Thus, you do get something extra when you spend more for fancy surge

protectors. Whether you need that extra protection is another question. I have yet to hear of a piece of Commodore equipment failing for lack of a power-line filter, although several systems have been lost for lack of a simple surge protector.

One more thing—don't expect more of a surge protector than it can deliver. Nothing will protect your system against a lightning strike on nearby wiring except unplugging the computer completely.

Q: In principle, the 64 can make use of more memory than the old PETs. But I am beginning to think it doesn't do more. My PET gives me 31K free, and the 64 gives me 38K plus a 4K block of RAM that Basic does not use. Am I being kidded about the memory capacity of the 64, and if not, why can't we get more memory out of the PET using similar techniques?

A: Both the PET and the 64 can address the same amount of memory at one time: 64K. The difference is that the PET came with less than 64K of RAM, and the 64 comes fully equipped. Both take some of the 64K for ROM, although in the 64's case, normally invisible RAM shares the addresses used by the ROM. The same is true of PETs equipped with the 8096 add-on memory board. In both cases, only machine language programs can take advantage of the added memory.

No one is fooling you about the 64's memory, but if you want to use all of it from Basic, you might be better off with a Plus/4. It uses special techniques to make all of its RAM available to Basic.

Q: I know the difference between RAM and ROM. I load a program from the Datassette into RAM. But what happens when I load a program in from a cartridge attached to the cartridge port? Does it go into RAM or what?

A: When a cartridge is installed, its ROM takes precedence over any RAM located in the same memory addresses. It doesn't have to load at all (because it is already connected to the machine at the correct addresses), as long as it contains a machine language program that the computer can obey directly from the cartridge's ROM.

A few cartridges contain Basic programs that relocate themselves inside the computer at start-up, and then run in the same RAM as other Basic programs. Such programs, however, are the exception rather than the rule.

Q: I find myself the owner of a Brother CE-50 electronic typewriter. After purchasing the proper interface and cables, I still find myself at a loss to know how to get it to work with my 64. Could you help me?

A: The data sheet you enclosed implies you may use either a Centronics parallel or an RS-232 serial interface from the Brother to the Commodore. Not knowing which you have, if either, I'll try it both ways.

The most popular connection is via a serial bus to a Centronics parallel interface. These are available everywhere now, from several makers, and have been discussed here before.

The alternative is an RS-232 interface, normally connected to Commodore's VIC 1011-A interface via a suitable cable. It connects to the user port like a modem, and is also usable with RS-232 modems.

A third alternative, new on the market, is Cardco's new Cardprint-PS, which includes both a serial and a parallel connector in a single interface connected to the serial bus of the 64.

Assuming you go with a parallel interface, it appears you simply turn switch 1 of your Brother interface off and make sure your interface is getting power from somewhere. Some interfaces are able to draw power from the printer itself; others plug into the cassette port of the 64 or a wall outlet.

If you have an RS-232 serial inter-

face instead, things are more complicated. Read about all the possible serial interface settings in your RS-232 interface manual. Then choose one and set the switches on the Brother to match. If, for example, you type

OPEN 2,2,0,CHR\$(6)+CHR\$(0)

you are asking for 300 baud, 8 bits, 1 stop bit, no parity and a 3-wire handshake. To set this on the Brother's switches, turn switches 1 and 3

on, switches 2, 4 and 5 off and ignore switch 6. Mind you, I'm basing these settings on your data sheet; I don't have a Brother printer myself. Let me know how it turns out. R

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Introducing Commodore 64 Machine Code

This book aims to introduce, in very simple terms, machine language programming, as well as some of the basic inner workings of the Commodore 64. Aside from several flaws in the text, it succeeds in accomplishing these aims.

Author Ian Sinclair's target reader is the Commodore 64 owner with some experience in Basic programming, but little or no background in electronics or computer science. A large number of computer users fit this description, and many of them would like to get into machine language.

A first look at machine language programming reveals many new (and often confusing) concepts, with minimal explanations. What is needed is some very simple guidance, and that is exactly what *Introducing Commodore 64 Machine Code* offers. It starts at the most basic level, with a chapter explaining ROM, RAM, bits and bytes, in a non-technical way that avoids the childish tone of many similar presentations.

The second chapter explains how variables, strings and programs are stored in memory. While this isn't strictly a machine language subject, many machine language projects require an understanding of it, and such an introduction is a good start toward understanding machine language itself. The explanations here are brief, but after all, the book is just an introduction. Deeper understanding will come from working with the material presented and from reading more advanced works.

The next three chapters explore the 6502/6510 microprocessor. Included in these chapters are a step-by-step description of the processor's role in executing a simple program, an introduction to hexadecimal and descriptions of registers and addressing modes. The material is oriented toward those with no prior exposure to it, so the simple descriptions are lim-

ited to elementary matters. With a little effort, most readers should be able to follow them and gain some valuable insights.

Halfway through the book, the first machine language program is presented. A simple screen-fill program is shown in flowchart, Basic and machine language versions, and every aspect of the program is explained. It takes 17 pages to cover this one program, and it's well worth it.

Another 16 pages are devoted to expanding and improving the screen-fill program, and once again everything is clearly explained from several angles. Understanding machine language concepts requires painstaking analysis, and it's a joy to see it done so well in a book.

The final chapters show how an assembler is used to create a machine language program. The assembler described is Mikro, which is not widely available in this country, but the explanations apply to all assemblers. Five appendices and a brief index round out the book.

Unfortunately, editorial flaws may ruin this book for many readers. Introductory books must be free of errors and points of confusion; this one is not. Part of the problem is the author's British English and his use of unfamiliar words. Throughout the book, the word "denary" is used in place of decimal, which is a bit distracting. When Sinclair refers to outside material, his European viewpoint is also reflected. The products he recommends are from England and Belgium—you'll never find them at Waldenbooks.

More importantly, there are too many technical errors. We're asked to press the enter key, or to look for FC errors; we're referred to Push and Pull commands as well. None of these apply to the Commodore 64, and many readers will waste their time discovering this.

Some simple editing could have corrected these flaws. Also, Prentice-Hall's ads for this book are somewhat misleading. One of them claims that this book "... includes sophisticated applications in fast-moving graphics and games." Since the book's most sophisticated program is one that makes a beep when a key is pressed,

with all the other programs being screen-fills, the advertisement is a bit misleading.

Introducing Commodore 64 Machine Code is full of excellent material for the beginning machine language programmer, but the technical and communicative flaws make it unnecessarily confusing. It covers its material adequately and in a well-organized way, but the book's many errors detract from its value as a beginner's tutorial.

Commodore 64 Fun and Games

This book is a collection of complete listings for 35 fun-and-games programs, written specifically and solely for the Commodore 64. In fact, none of the programs will run on the VIC-20 or the PET without major modifications.

The programs are written in Basic, and they take advantage of the special features and capabilities of the Commodore 64 (i.e., color, sound, sprites and character graphics). All you need to do is type a program listing into the computer (exactly as listed), and then follow the instructions for play, given in the introduction to each program.

One of the best things about the book is the complete, clear and concise explanations of how to read and type the program listings. This subject is treated very thoroughly, leaving no unanswered questions.

By typing in program listings from this book, the beginner will acquire a much better understanding of the graphics symbolism used on the Commodore 64. The book's tabular print-out of the Commodore graphics symbols is superb, possibly the best that I've seen anywhere. This feature alone justifies the purchase price of the book.

For those who have neither the time nor the inclination to spend endless

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


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
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most other books) is treated in such a way that a number of commands made sense to me for the first time. This is a popular subject, and yet very little practical information has found its way into the hands of Commodore owners. The authors are to be commended for including it. However, it's rather odd that the somewhat related (and simpler) topic of relative files isn't even mentioned!

In Chapter 7, you'll find out how to use the keyboard, joystick and paddles for games and other uses. There's enough information to get going, of course, but unfortunately, very little attention is paid to the VIAs internal to the VIC-20. It's knowledge of how the VIAs work that lets you use the keyboard, joystick and paddles effectively. Despite this shortcoming, the chapter does show you how to do some things with these devices.

Chapter 9 is one of my favorites, since it gives you a chip-by-chip run-down of how the VIC-20 works. I've never seen this idea carried out in any other book, and the perspective it gives

you is very valuable. By learning a little (even in general terms) about micro-computer architecture, your skill as a programmer will grow considerably. Exotic and unique programs will become possible if you learn to exploit some of the hidden hardware features of the VIC-20.

Chapter 10 takes on the popular subject of machine language programming. Since there isn't much that one can do in a single chapter, the authors have elected to provide a simple overview of the subject. You will need to fill in some of the details from other reference books. Nonetheless, you will find several very practical ideas presented here, such as loading and saving machine language programs, creating interrupt-driven subroutines and converting machine language routines to data statements. Also included in this chapter is a good 6502 command set summary (not just a photocopy of the manufacturer's data sheet).

The book concludes with a number of appendices. Included among these are the usual table of screen codes and

ASCII characters, memory maps and background and border color codes. The last appendix includes a list of Basic (as opposed to Kernal) routines that you can use from within machine language. Routines to convert integers to floating point, floating point to integers, and all of the arithmetic and operator functions, are described. In all cases, the accompanying description tells you how to set up for the routine, the calling address and where to find the result.

Of course, a reference book is of no value unless you can find the information you need, quickly and conveniently. *VIC-20 Exposed* uses indenting, boldfacing and subtitles to help you find what you're looking for. The book has a good feel—it gives you what you need without a lot of excess. Also, the fine index guarantees that this is the first book you'll turn to when you need to find VIC-20 information in a hurry!

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
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On Printers

I enjoyed "Selecting the Right Printer," by Jim Strasma in your January 1985 issue. I'd like to give you some comments on our choice for a typewriter/printer.

We use the Olivetti Praxis 39/41, which we obtained by mail order from DAK Industries. The major differences between the Praxis 39/41 and the Praxis 30, which you reviewed, are speed, price and interfacing.

The Praxis 39/41 runs at 12 cps (twice as fast). The typewriter/interface combination cost us \$355 by mail order. The LCU 41B interface is Centronics-compatible, with a 2K buffer. It is also RS-232-compatible.

What came as a shock was that Olivetti chose to supply a connecting cable only for Commodore computers. In addition, DIP switches on the interface can be set so that the interface works with Commodore ASCII! The cable provided plugs into the user port, and Easy Script (or any other word processor that supports RS-232) can drive the combination.

This means that we have a daisy-wheel typewriter/printer without the additional \$50 to \$120 for the Centronics-style interface that is usually required with other printers. We feel we got a good buy for the money.
