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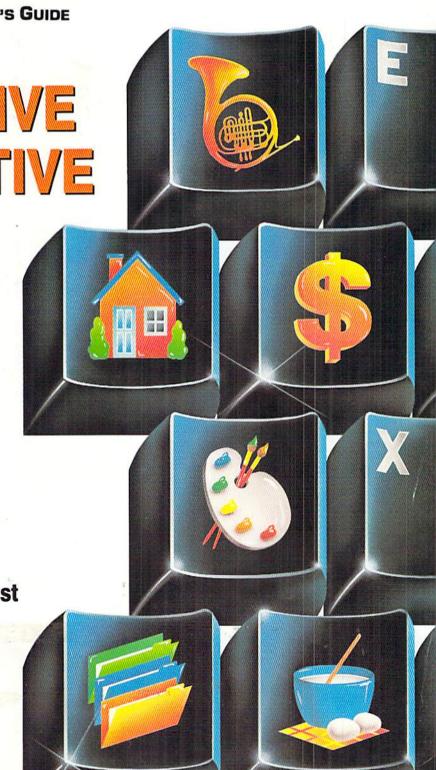
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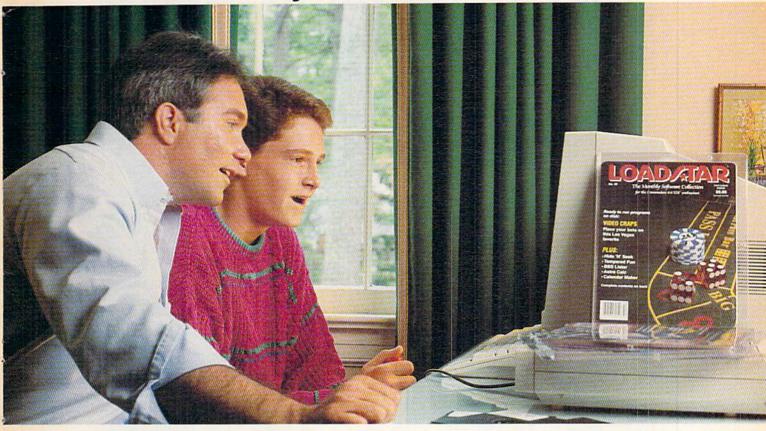
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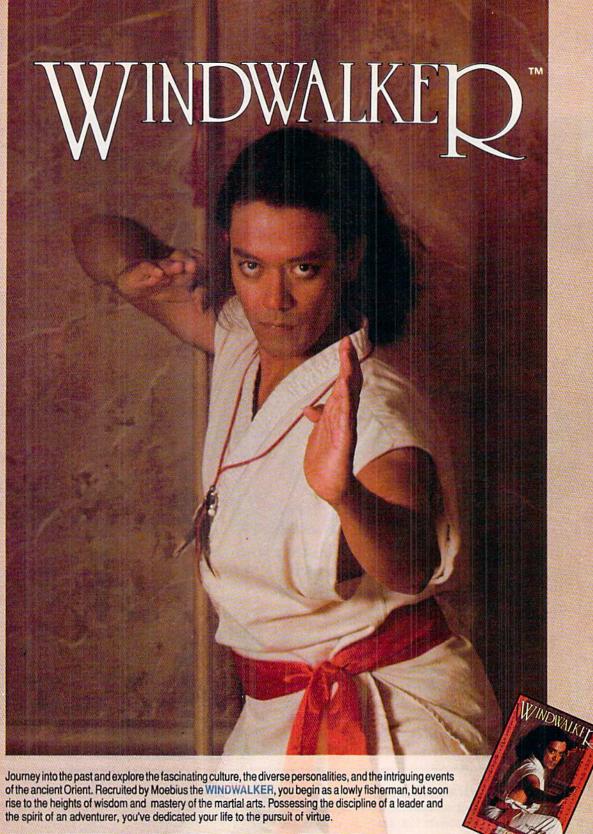
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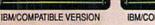
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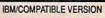
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RUNNING RUMINATIONS

You don't need to be a psychic to know what's on Commodore's mind these days. Every signal that comes out of the Pennsylvania headquarters shouts, "The future is the Amiga!"

The company, under the direction of its new president, Harold Copperman, has embarked upon an aggressive strategy to position the Amiga competitively against the Apple and IBM in the business, education and vertical markets.

Unfortunately, this energy directed towards the high-end market

is unmatched in the home computer arena, which was once dominated by Commodore. Commodore's attempted turnaround is apparently headed in the wrong direction. Instead of trying to serenade the federal government and big business, Commodore should be attempting to shore up its badly battered image among the home computing crowd.

The Commodore name, once synonymous with price and performance, is now better known for lack of support, management upheavals, drooping sales and lethargy. Despite all of this, the king of the 8-bits is still the C-64, which has introduced millions to the world of computing. It may be long in the tooth, but it remains the only viable massmarket computer. For under \$500, you can get a

complete system—computer, monitor, disk drive and joystick.

Commodore has stated, and RUN has duly reported, that the company "will actively pursue new sales and merchandising strategies for the. . .C-64," but we see little evidence of this. If Commodore is to keep the respect of its large user base, it should either aggressively support its existing 8-bit line or offer an alternative.

Our sources indicate that there is waning enthusiasm at Commodore for the C-65 project, which Commodore has been working on this year to replace the 64/128 line. With its enhanced color, graphics and sound, built-in disk drive and increased speed, this new 8-bit computer would be the answer that millions of home computerists are looking for. Best of all, it would be compatible with most existing C-64 software. And at a low price!

However, Commodore, reacting to the bad press this machine has received and reluctant to be associated with the low-end market, apparently is lukewarm toward this product.

Commodore's other alternative is to reduce the price of the Amiga 500, which, at over \$800 for computer and monitor, does not meet the price criterion of the home market.

As we enter a new decade, I urge Commodore to reconsider its attitude toward the low-end market. It seems folly to abandon a market it has dominated during the last decade in favor of one that's full of uncertainties.

Here's hoping that the new year brings RUN readers happiness, prosperity and glitch-free computing. And here's hoping that Commodore re-addresses the needs of the home computer market. The company owes it to the millions of first-time computer buyers and loyal Commodore computerists.

\$56B VERIFYING WITH RUN SCRIPT

Here's an almost foolproof method of determining if you're working with the latest version of a document created with RUN Script 64 or 128. Load in one file of the document, and then press F1, followed by the F key, to display the number of bytes free in the command bar at the top of the screen. Then load in the other version of the document and repeat the process. Compare the number of bytes free. If they match, the chances are good that the documents are identical. If you remember adding text to the first version of the document, the latest version will show fewer bytes free. If, on the other hand, you deleted text, the version with more bytes free will be the latest.

\$56C ILLEGAL C-128 TRAPPING SEASON

You can use the unimplemented Off and Quit commands in Basic 7.0 to develop programming subroutines similar to those found in Amiga, Apple Macintosh and other 68000-series computers. I've written a short routine that shows how to use Trap, the unimplemented Off command and the Err\$ function to execute a perfectly functioning subroutine, all without the use of a single Goto or GoSub! Give it a try, it works remarkably well.

\$56D CURING NON-RANDOM RND NUMBERS

Even novice programmers quickly realize that the C-64's RND function does not return a series of truly random numbers. 64 Non-Random RND uses the random number generator of voice 3 of the SID sound chip to enhance the RND function. Run my program in conjunction with any program

that uses RND and the result is truly random numbers.

For reference purposes, note that run-stop/restore does not deactivate my utility. Also, voice 3 will not function properly when 64 Non-Random RND is activated.

\$56E LEFT/RIGHT SCREEN CLEAR 64

The next time you write a C-64 program, try incorporating Left/Right Screen Clear 64 into it. After typing in, saving and running this machine language routine, it resides in memory at location 49152. Then, entering SYS 49152 in either Program or Direct mode clears the entire screen from the center in a left/right sweeping motion.

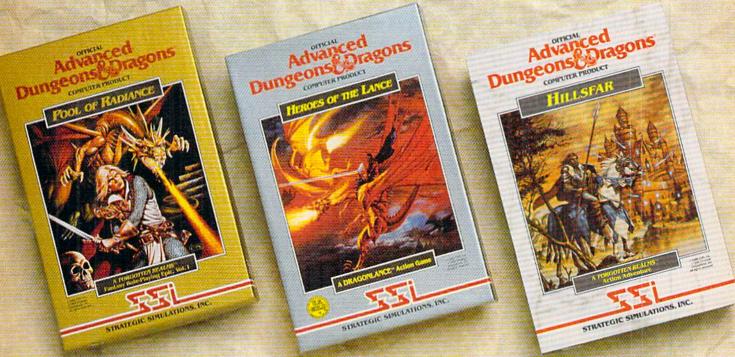

What sets Whirlpool Screen Clear 64/128 apart from other screen-clearing routines is that it not only works in C-64 mode, but also in 40-Column C-128 mode. It works by starting at the center of the screen and clearing characters in a counter-clockwise motion, finally ending at the home screen position.

You can modify the routine for use in your own programs, provided you don't change the Data statements at the end. You may renumber them, however. You can also alter the speed of the animation by setting the variable C to any value between 0 and 255.

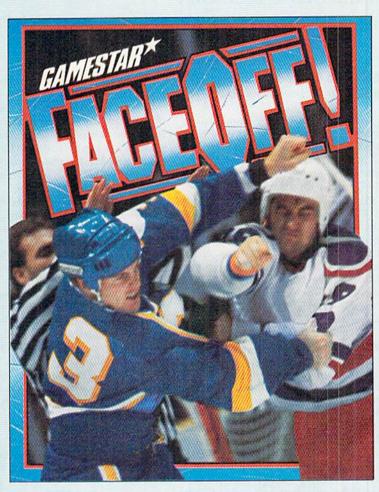
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NEWS AND NEW PRODUCTS

RUN reports on the World of Commodore show; two games contests are announced; and new product releases are surveyed.

RUNNING COMMENTS ON THE WORLD OF COMMODORE SHOW

VALLEY FORGE, PA—Commodore Business Machines held its World of Commodore show last September 22–24, and RUN solicited comments from some of its authors who attended the show. Here's what they said.

Michael Cavanaugh—Two images stood out in this reviewer's mind: "One is of a gentleman who complained that he had gone to every booth in the show in an attempt to buy a 128 or 128D, but was unable to find one. Another is of Commodore showing off their MS-DOS-based Colt machines, with no one at the show carrying any MS-DOS-compatible software."

The Creative Micro Designs booth was the saving grace for Cavanaugh. Curiosity there centered on the prototypes of a Commodore-compatible hard drive (available with either 20- or 40-megabyte storage capacity for under \$600) and a power-backed interface for C-64/128 REUs, called RAMLink. Said Cavanaugh, "While CMD is best known for its JiffyDOS disk drive enhancements, the implications of this new hardware are exciting enough that, for me, the CMD booth alone was worth the ten dollar admission price."

Loren Lovhaug—For this writer, the "excitement generated at the World of Commodore show was on the 8-bit side." Although there were "fewer developers for the show on the whole" than in the past, this year a "larger percentage" were C-64/128-dedicated developers.

Besides the CMD products mentioned above, Lovhaug felt that the introduction of Brown Boxes' (26 Concord Rd., Bedford, MA 01730) QBB-B (\$119 plus \$3 s/h) was significant for Commodore 8-bit fans. The 64K battery-backed cartridge lets owners of the 64K Quick Brown Box upgrade to 128K, and it keeps data intact even after the computer is turned off. The QBB-B is identical in size to the QBB and is designed to run on an extender card.

Lou Wallace—RUN's contributing editor deemed a few yet-to-be-released 8-bit software programs high on his list of "hot" products. He mentioned Rick Kane's 80-column color interlace program (written in Basic 8), Bill Coleman's C-128 graphic interface terminal program for GEnie, and Tom Brown's 128 desktop publishing package.

RUN reporters also noted other software/hardware manufacturers and proponents of the Commodore 8-bit line. Representatives from Abacus, Xetec, Berkeley Softworks, Busy Bee and Q-Link were busy displaying and selling products.

Last, but not least, Commodore's presence was enhanced by a large booth (featuring mostly Amigas and PCs) and the appearance of Lloyd Mahaffey (marketing vice president) and Howard Diamond (education director).

One thing's certain—this World of Commodore show illustrated 64 and 128 support at the "grass roots" level!

A QUICKER FILE PICKER-UPPER

In "The Nuts and Bolts of GEOS to RUN Paint" (RUN, November 1989, p. 39), author Tim Walsh described an elaborate process that converts a geo-Paint file to RUN Paint with a "minimum of file fiddling." His way required a computer with a reset switch, a feature not included on the C-64.

There's another and quicker way to accomplish this without requiring a reset switch or exiting GEOS.

Joe Buckley's PaintView II on RUN's GEOS Power Pak (also available for downloading from RUN's Online Library on QuantumLink) allows you to view and scroll a geoPaint document in a full 320-by-200-pixel screen area without using geoPaint. And, after positioning a part of the screen you want to save, you simply press the S key and a dialog box pops up requesting you to type in a name to save as a Doodle! file. Renaming the prefix to RPH., so that RUN Paint will recognize the file, is easier to do under GEOS than with normal Commodore DOS.

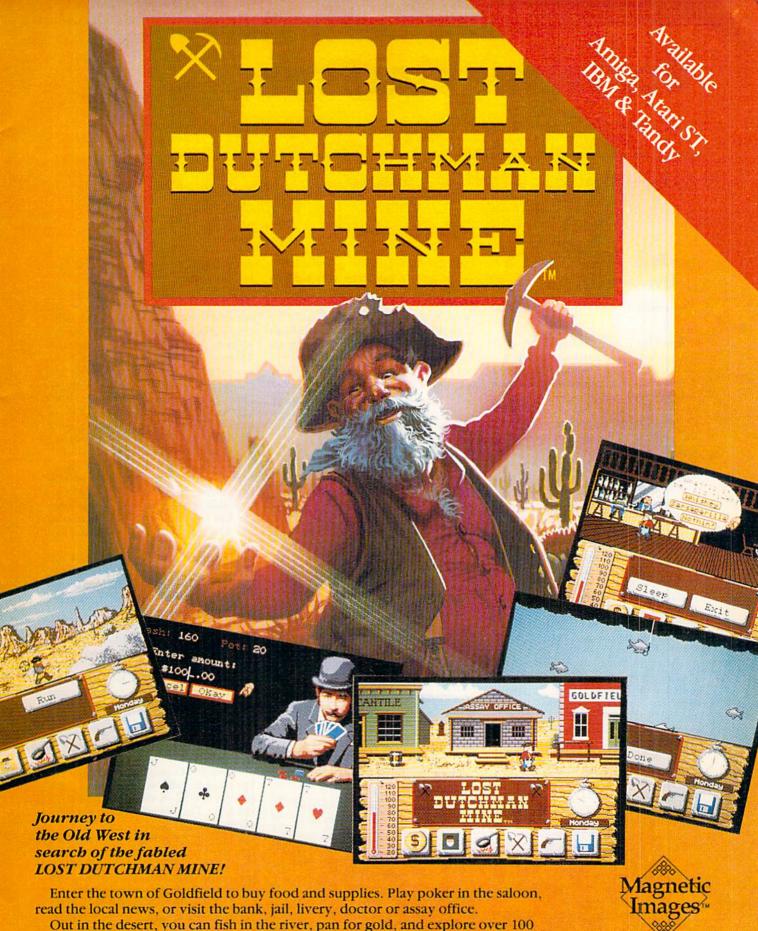

FIRE KING A-

Good Guy's Mission:

Exterminate the Big, Bad Beast

Fire King is one of the most enjoyable C-64 role-playing games I've seen in a long time. There's nothing essentially different about the story, but it's so well programmed that it's just a pleasure to play.

For as long as anyone can remember, the harmony of the land has been maintained by the four Mages of the elements: Air, Fire, Water and Earth. The Fire Mage, who is king, is suddenly killed by a magical beast. The Air Mage, who returned to tell the tale, is seriously wounded, the Water Mage can't be found, and the Earth Mage has gone insane.

The evil beast was also killed, but another one inhabits the catacombs, and from time to time comes to the surface to snack on the townsfolk. The Mayor has already sent one brave adventurer to slay the creature. On the assumption he has also become lunch for the beast, it's now your turn.

To begin your quest, you choose from among six intrepid adventurers, each with his or her own set of attributes. Your first job is to obtain provisions and get the "lay of the land."

When you're ready, you can head to the town square. There you'll find an arms store, a shop, a temple and the Thieves Guild. Along with things that you'll need in your quest, each spot also has its own perils. There are training rooms behind the Thieves Guild where you can get some fighting experience—you'll need the practice.

Fire King's graphics are particularly nice, and the scrolling is extremely smooth. Disk accesses are quite speedy, enhancing the flow of the game, and the sound is also well done.

The game uses a joystick and function keys. One thing I find distracting is the status symbols; it's easy to lose track of what I have. Players are also quite limited in what they can carry, but choosing carefully eliminates this problem.

The game's landscape is not gigantic, but I suspect the authors opted to concentrate on quality graphics and smooth programming instead. Fire King will give you hours of fun with very little hassle. ARKANOID II: THE REVENGE OF DOH A-

Bashing Bricks Becomes Bigger and Bolder

It was nearly two years ago when Arkanoid revitalized the ball-and-brick game genre for the C-64. Now Taito has released a sequel that brings still

more delights to those who love to "follow the bouncing ball."

As in the original, the setting of Arkanoid II is outer space, and the onscreen bar you control represents an interplanetary craft that deflects energy spheres. Each of the sequel's 67 levels—44 more than in the first program—has a unique pattern of blocks. Some are indestructible, and some continually appear and disappear, while others disintegrate after a ball hits them one or more times. You conquer a level when all of the third type of bricks are eliminated.

You start with four spheres and can obtain more. Throughout the game, malevolent aliens wander about and divert spheres from their paths. The more time that is spent on a level, the faster the ball travels and the harder it is to hit. The game ends when the last ball slips past the bar.

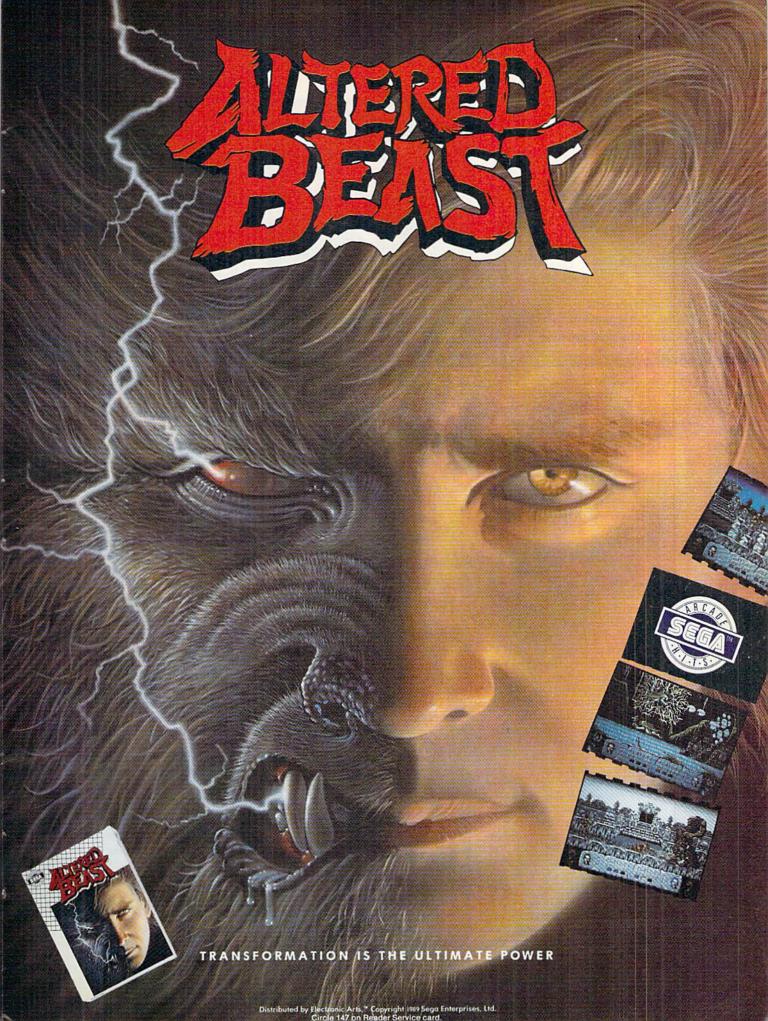
Arkanoid II offers three control options: keyboard, joystick and mouse. The latter device is especially well suited for the precise horizontal movements that this game requires.

When certain bricks disappear, a labeled capsule is released. If the bar catches it, you temporarily receive one of 14 different "powers," twice as many as in the first game. Among these powers are the creation of a second bar and MEGA energy balls that slice through every kind of brick. The necessity of learning how to effectively use the capsules adds a bit of mental challenge to the contest.

Arkanoid II's graphics and animation are exceptionally well done, and each pattern of bricks is colorful and sharply defined. The sound effects are also excellent.

However, the software could've been improved in one minor respect. Taito should have indicated more clearly on the box that the C-64 version of the game does not include a construction set.

Also, potential purchasers should realize that the program is very demanding. For example, it takes a great deal of skill to precisely guide a ball to the last few target bricks that end up remaining on each level. In addition, the

software was programmed so that every new game begins on the first screen; as a result, some players will never reach the final level.

But to those who are up to the challenge, Arkanoid II can be extremely entertaining. It is that rare sequel that is markedly superior to a very fine original. (Taito Software, Inc., 267 West Esplanade, North Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada V7M 1A5. C-64/\$29.95.)

SPIDER-MAN AND CAPTAIN AMERICA IN DR. DOOM'S REVENGE B

Here They Are, To Save the Day!

The line between comics and computer games grows thinner every dayeverything from straight licensing deals to interactive comics to games that have comic book instructions. There are even computer games that have crossed the line the other way to become comic books. Still, Dr. Doom's Revenge has taken a new twist with this genre.

Combining the look of a comic book with the feel of an arcade game, Dr. Doom's Revenge not only packs a (Marvel-produced) comic book inside, but actually has a plot that advances via onscreen panels. The story revolves around the evil Dr. Doom, ruler of the kingdom Latveria, who has decided to once again make his bid for world power (through the use of his stolen intercontinental ballistic missile). It's up to Spider-Man and Captain America to stop him, which won't be an easy task because Doom has assembled ten of the toughest villains in the world to augment his already formidable army of robot guards.

You advance through the strip portion of the adventure, moving from panel to panel at your own pace, by manipulating a pointer. When an action scene occurs, the pointer stops, and you shift to the arcade phase. You assume the personas, first of "Spidey," then of "Cap," as they sling web and shield at their various attackers.

The software features a Save function that lets you pick up from wherever you left off in a previous game. My advice is to execute this option prior to every battle. Also, when initially confronting each foe, if your first impulse is to stand toeto-toe to slug it out, don't. Check out the background of each character, as there are some heavy hitters in the group-

yes, even some who are physically much stronger than our heroes. It's important to remember that Cap is a superb athlete in top physical shape, while Spidey is quite strong, very nimble and can cling to walls. As offensive weapons, Cap has his shield and Spidey his webbing.

And, getting through Doom's castle is really only half the battle, as you still have not only to go up against Doom himself, but to disarm his missile as well. (Paragon Software; distributed by Medalist International, 180 Lakefront Drive, Hunt Valley, MD 21030. C-64/\$39.95.)

HARRIER 7 C+

Good Luck, Pilot, You're Going To Need It!

Just when you thought it was safe to get back into the cockpit, along comes Harrier 7, a flight simulation/combat program. Harrier 7 is not a "you-arethere," first-person type of game; rather, the action is viewed from the sidelines. From a mechanical point of view, control-via joystick and a handful of keys-is extremely easy.

You begin with three Harrier aircraft.

Your mission is to jet across enemy territory and destroy their missile silos, heavily fortified bases and MIG aircraft. It'll take practice, daring and lots of luck before you can emerge the victor.

From the moment you gently lift off the aircraft carrier, you are besieged by enemy anti-aircraft shells, Exocet missiles and determined MIGs. Before you can defend yourself against these nasties, you have to learn to control your overly sensitive aircraft. Until you become adept at joystick maneuvers, you find your actions tend to over-exaggerate the aircraft's performance-usually resulting in "pilot-induced incidental terra firma osculation" (i.e., you crash).

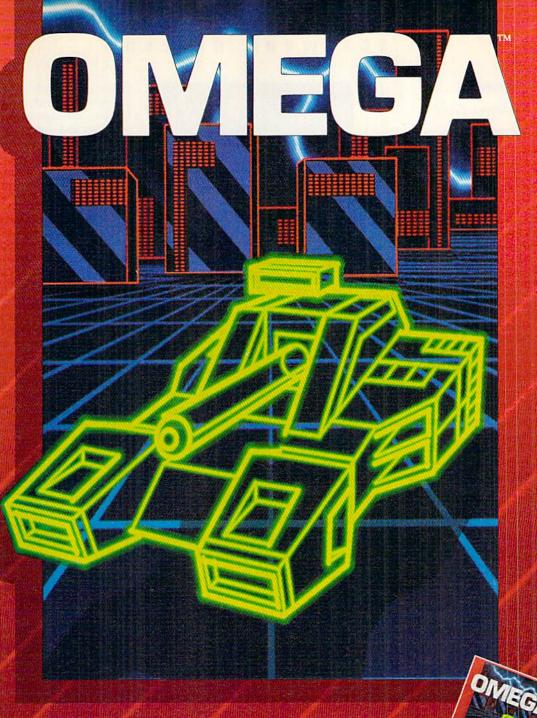
The graphics screen is a split view. It consists of the window to the battle area and a stark control panel that displays simplistic radar information, fuel gauge, weapon selection and score area. As your aircraft travels either left or right, the graphics scroll smoothly with it, over sea and land. Although they may not win any awards, the graphics are handsome and well suited to this type of game.

While the action is certainly fast and furious, it's almost impossible to defend yourself from all the hazards this program offers. In a short period of time, the screen becomes very busy, and you may have initial difficulty in identifying your targets. Especially harrowing are MIG dogfights, where enemy aircraft seem to pop out of nowhere. Since the MIGs don't stay in your field of vision long enough for you to get off a clean shot, it becomes a simple matter of persistence and luck.

Documentation comes in the form of a single cardboard insert, which is just as well-you need little in the way of instructions once you load Harrier 7. More games should have the same kind of "boot and go" environment.

I slowly came to the conclusion that any criticism I aim at this software evolves from its lack of depth and staying power when compared to the bigger titles, which is unfair. If you're expecting beautifully detailed graphics, multiple playing levels and digitized explosions, look elsewhere. If, on the other hand, you're ready to hand over 15 dollars for an evening or two of entertainment (the price of two movie tickets and a large bucket of popcorn where I live), then give Harrier 7 a test flight. 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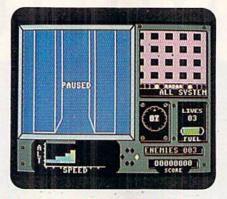

An Above-Street Level Battle Against Time and **Terrorists**

It's 1997, and back in the USSR, rebel militarists have seized many of the country's cities. Even worse, the escalating conflict threatens to trigger nuclear conflict with other major powers. The government has no effective force of its own: however, it does have one crazy volunteer piloting a battle-scarred AH-64 Apache helicopter. Once again, you are the "only game in town," and the stakes are peace or nuclear destruction!

In 40 seek-and-destroy missions, Apache Strike pits you against progressively tougher opposition. Your primary objective in each tour of duty is to knock out the city's Strategic Defense Computers (SDCs), thus causing local rebel forces to collapse; your primary problem is dealing with swarms of enemy helicopters.

Granted, your AH-64 Apache is not

exactly a "sitting duck." Rapid-fire cannons rip apart enemy choppers and tanks as if they were ripe melons, and just three well-placed missiles wipe out an SDC. High-tech instrumentation complements the speed, altitude and fuel indicators. To the right of your bulletproof windshield, radar locates enemy craft in the immediate vicinity. Distance to an SDC (in city blocks) and bearing are continuously updated.

Other aids include a count of remaining enemy aircraft and a 14-character scrolling message center that supplies warnings and status reports.

Like "old time" flight simulator packages, Apache Strike's forward view trades away detail for speed and perspective. Thus, while each city is merely a grid of soaring square columns, and enemy craft are barely recognizable, you do get something approaching the look of real-time flight in three dimensions. The game achieves the right "feel" through responsive controls and fast/slow/hover speed settings that supply ample maneuverability.

Flying the AH-64 is fun, but fighting with it exposes severe weaknesses. Since you lack any targeting aids (e.g., crosshairs), aiming your shots is largely a matter of pointing in the general direction of an enemy craft. In the heat of combat, you should be able to rely upon what you see. Yet, given poor vertical perspective rendition, the bar graph altimeter is your only indicator of distance from street level. Surprise crashes are a major hazard.

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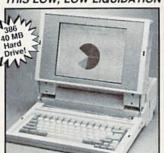

With three lives allotted per mission, fuel boosts for each kill, an option to select starting level, fast restart and its 10-position, high-scores roster (maintained on disk), Apache Strike can easily draw you into multiple replays. However, be sure to see the program's help screen, not the manual, for correct key assignments. And, don't expect ace-class combat; do expect an engaging flight simulator challenge. GAUNTLET II C-

A Rerun Through Dungeons and Mazes

Gauntlet II, an arcade dungeongame sequel, offers the usual maze-running fare for one or two players.

You must choose to play as one of four characters: Merlin, Thor, Thyra or Questor. Each hero is different from the

others in regard to overall prowess, which is broken down into shooting ability, magical powers, physical dexterity and armor protection.

Your joystick makes your on-screen figure move in any direction. Pressing the joystick button causes your character to shoot bullets, or in the case of Questor, arrows. Contact with certain enemies also destroys them.

A potpourri of hobgoblins-ghosts, demons and sorcerers, to name a fewproliferate out of monster generators, so it's best to smash these spawning nests pronto! Each type of creature poses a different threat. Most of them wear you down by constantly bumping into you or throwing objects at your body.

You can explore over 100 different mazes in this game and accomplish the usual dungeon-related tasks-finding secret amulets, imbibing magical potions, picking up keys, teleporting around, and so on. Of course, certain items confer upon you different gains, from increased vigor to temporary invisibility. A key, for example, might let you open a treasure chest and earn

extra game points. Drinking health potions or eating food prolong your physical well-being, which is listed as points on the screen. Enemy battering, along with time, erode this score.

I could go on, but you might get the wrong impression, since a description of Gauntlet II's general features reads better than actually playing the game.

My complaints: The computer shows a profile image of your figure gliding in mid-air like a shadow over the ground, creating a point of view that's impossible, perspective-wise; the game's terrain is flat and featureless; your screen's overhead view reveals animated graphics too tiny to appreciate; and the basic routine follows the same old formula. It's like watching a television rerun.

While it may be a good entry-level game for beginners, Gauntlet II is one gauntlet you'll probably want to lay down rather than run. (Mindscape, Inc., 3444 Dundee Rd., Northbrook, IL 60062. C-64/\$29.95.)

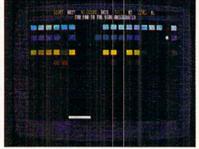

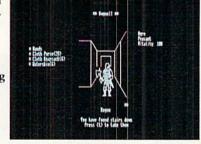

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In Search of Creativity Software

ast month, garbed in pith helmets and wielding machetes, we hacked our way into the jungle of Commodore software to search for programs that are useful, not just entertaining. Amidst the tangle of game titles, we discovered the Pyramid of Productivity, containing lots of programs both old and new. Now it's time to don our jungle garb again, to head out in search of creativity software—programs that can help you express and enjoy yourself in many ways. Are you ready?

Blazing a new trail is hard work, but eventually we spy an opening labeled Cavern of Creativity in the side of a hill. This is it! We duck our heads and step inside.

GRAPHICS

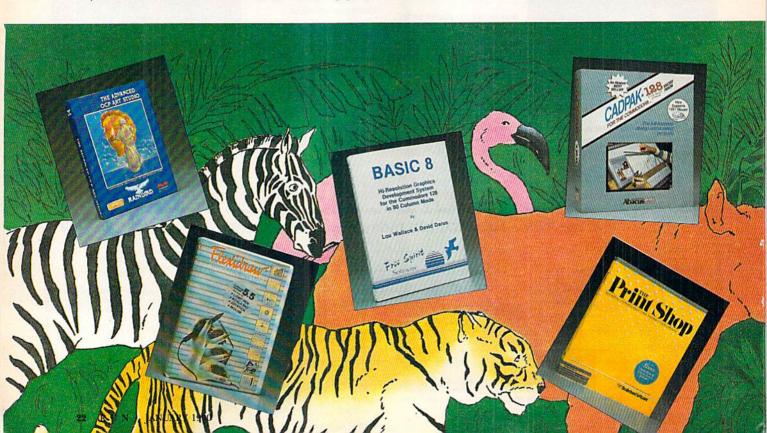
Instantly, a palette of brilliant colors shimmers in our torchlight. We gasp in astonishment at the sparkling gems before us—a wealth of wondrous graphic arts programs. There is Rainbird's **The Advanced OCP Art Studio**, featuring windows, icons and pull-down menus, which shines as one of the finest color graphics programs for the C-64. And just beyond is **Doodle!**, a C-64 hi-res color drawing program

from Crystal Rose; withstanding the test of time, it has established a standard for graphics formats.

Nearby perch Inkwell's Flexidraw, a hi-res drawing package for use with that company's lightpen, and Sketchpad 128, from Free Spirit, supporting 80-Column mode. Then we catch sight of Spectrum 128, also from Free Spirit, a paint program for the 128D or 128 with 64K video RAM upgrade, and Basic 8, a graphics programming environment for the 128 with 80-column display.

The walls seem more geometric in form as we enter the computer-aided-design (CAD) room. Here we find Abacus's Cadpak, a bit-mapped program in C-64 and C-128 versions that can swap pictures with other graphics programs. The newer version supports input from the keyboard, 1351 mouse or lightpen, and it sports a dimensioning feature for scaled output. We also marvel at the professional features of Free Spirit's Home Designer Plus 128, a two-dimensional CAD program with object-based graphics you can zoom in on for heightened detail.

Suddenly, shadowy forms flap by overhead! We whirl around to face Kira Corporation's Flexi-Aided Design and

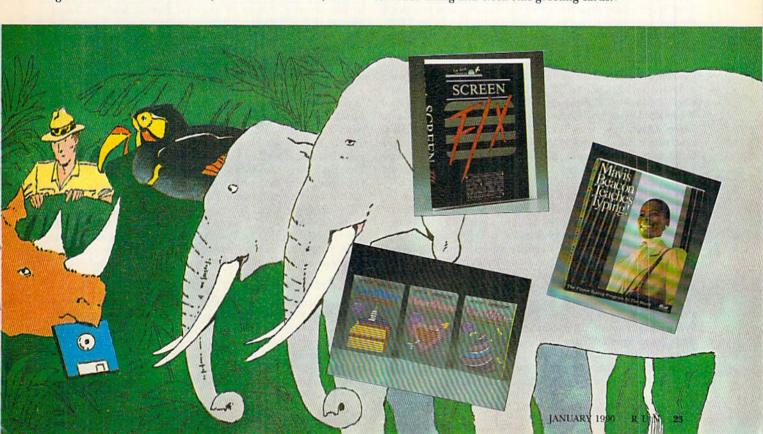
Perspectives II, C-64 programs for drawing, manipulating and animating "three-dimensional" wire-frame objects, and IHT's **CAD 3-D**, also for the C-64, which lets you create 3-D wire-frame designs that can be saved in Doodle! format or printed by a Commodore-compatible printer.

Bursting with renewed imagination, we hurry on to find more treasures and come to a row of nooks filled with myriad specialty graphics programs for the C-64. First are Broderbund's The Print Shop and The Print Shop Companion, as well as Unison World's PrintMaster Plus, all three of which produce greeting cards, banners, calendars, posters, invitations and personal stationery. Other crevices hold Activision's Post Cards; Hi Tech Expression's Card-Ware, PartyWare and HeartWare; Intracorp's Bumper Sticker Maker, Business Card Maker and Button & Badge Maker; and Simon & Schuster's Great International Paper Airplane Kit.

Certificates on the walls of the next recess announce Award Maker, from Baudville, AwardWare, from Hi Tech, and Springboard's Certificate Maker, all ready to help acknowledge achievement. Next door, Create-A-Calendar, from

Epyx, waits to produce customized daily, weekly, monthly and annual calendars, while Spinnaker's **Business Form Shop** for the C-64 is ready to let you design and save custom form layouts. Then, last in the row, come **Leroy's Label Maker**, from Cheatsheet Products, providing merge capability with popular C-64/C-128 databases and word processors, and **Label Wizard**, from Kracker Jax, which combines text with PrintMaster or Print Shop graphics.

Motion in the shadows lures us further down the passageway to a room full of magic. As we step inside, our eyes are bedazzled by **Cybervideo**, Touchstone's integrated environment for creating animations with hi-res color graphics, sprites, text, music and sound effects; **Slideshow Creator**, from Kracker Jax, and **Moving Pictures**, from CDA, both C-64 programs for creating animation with graphics from popular drawing programs; **Video Title Shop**, from Datasoft, for designing and adding text borders and graphics screens to video recordings; and **Screen F/X**, from Solutions Unlimited, an in-depth package for creating professional quality graphics, including wipes, dissolves and other special effects, for video titling and electronic greeting cards.





Near the end of the graphics corridor, a cryptic message on the wall instructs, "Descend for pleasure, self-improvement and enlightenment." We clamber down the rickety steps to the next level of the Cavern of Creativity.

How To Do IT

At the bottom of the steps, we're lured by a faint rhythmic tapping into a room full of typing programs. Low tables hold The Software Toolworks' Mavis Beacon Teaches Typing, Simon & Schuster's Typing Tutor IV, Type!, from Broderbund, Tempo Typing, from Radarsoft, and Scarborough's Mastertype, all providing exercises and/or games that teach ten-finger typing on the C-64. A quiet corner nearby holds Free Spirit's Easy Sign 64, a tool for learning and practicing the sign language alphabet. The quiet is broken by an S.O.S., and we dash around the corner to rescue Free Spirit's Morse Code Trainer, but it's just practicing.

Since nothing is amiss, we move along to inspect a nook floored with black-and-white tiles. There's a brain-exercising software package poised on each tile, among them The Software Toolworks' Chessmaster 2100, Enlightenment's Paul Whitehead Teaches Chess and Jerry Silman's Guide to Chess Openings, as well as Cardinal Software's Cardinal Chessmate, all providing instruction and practice in the traditional strategy game. CBS's Charles Goren on Bridge, Radarsoft's Bridgemaster and Bridge 5.0, from Artworx, rest on other tiles.

Descending deeper into the cavern, we spot a bejeweled chest off to one side, bursting with what may be ancestral scrolls. On closer inspection we find Genealogy Software's Family Tree, a dynamic system for developing your own family's genealogical table. Family Roots, from Quinsept, Arbor Aide, from Software Solutions, Byteware's three-module Software for the Genealogist, and VitaStat, by Don Marsh, are also stuffed in the coffer.

Listen! There's strange, haunting music coming from the alcove across the way! Peeking inside, we discover Abacus's Synthy music synthesizer software for the C-64, Mindscape's Bank Street Music Writer and Electronic Arts' Instant Music. After a pause to savor the sounds, we head into the next room and encounter a marble podium supporting a leather-bound book. It's a weighty tome, and the first page rec-

ommends that we start by improving our language skills with Timeworks' Evelyn Wood Dynamic Reader, Mindscape's Crossword Magic or Radarsoft's Crossword for the C-64. In the same vein of self-improvement, we also find R.S.V.P., from Blue Lion, which teaches proper etiquette for business and social situations, and Remember!, from Britannica, for studying and remembering facts, lists, sequences and relationships.

Oh! What was that smell? The aroma of exotic spices draws us into a bustling room where America Cooks is bubbling under the direction of Concept Development Associates. Their series of Great Chefs is here also, as well as Free Spirit's Recipe Filer and Merrill Ward's Celebrity Cookbook, featuring favorite recipes of popular figures such as Frank Sinatra, Ronald Reagan, Bob Hope and Sophia Loren. For those with less in mind, there's Scarborough's Original Boston Computer Diet and The Model Diet, from Softsync, with a calorie guide to determine your ideal weight and nutritional requirements.

Following a call from "beyond," we penetrate the depths of the cavern, where a sense of mystery shrouds ESP Tester, Fun Biorhythms and Tarot 128, all, appropriately enough, from Free Spirit. But some mystery is dispelled by Merrill Ward's The Dream Machine, which analyzes, interprets and logs dreams, as well as Timothy Leary's Mind Mirror, from Electronic Arts, and Mind Prober, from Human Edge, both C-64 programs that reveal what makes people tick.

Our torches are dim now, but their waning glow illuminates three rather personal programs: Dr. Ruth's Computer Game of Good Sex, from Avalon Hill, The Sexual Edge, from Merrill Ward, and The Love Quest, from Intracorp. These C-64 programs can help analyze your sexuality and relationships and determine your compatibility with others.

THE END OF THE QUEST

As we ascend to the exit, we reflect on our finds and acknowledge that, although there are some impressive new products, many of the best creativity programs (as well as last month's productivity finds) for Commodores are classics. Reflecting further, we realize that, while most of the programs are designed for the C-64, we did bag some 128-mode packages.

If you want to learn more about these programs and others,

you can read about them in past issues of RUN. Comprehensive articles, covering a number of packages, have included "Electronic Expressions" (on combining text and graphics, December '86), "Electronic Expressions Update" (May '87), "All in the Family Tree" (genealogy, December '87), "A Happy New You!" RUNbase 128

Here's what you've been searching for! An easy-to-use database for your record-keeping needs.

hile there are several good databases available for the C-128, they all offer more options and complexity than I ever need. So, I wrote RUNbase 128, a simple, easy-to-use database for the C-128 in 80-Column mode. RUNbase can handle about 2000 records, so it's great for everything from flexible mailing lists to disk catalogs, inventories or what have you.

Type in RUNbase from Listing 1, using RUN's Checksum program to check for typing errors, then save a couple of copies to disk. When you run the program, a Main menu with eight options appears. Highlight your choice by using the cursor-up and -down keys; then press the return key. Following are descriptions of the Main menu options.

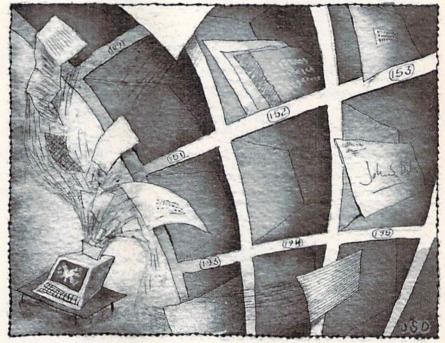
Create a Database generates a new RUNbase 128 database. When the program asks how many fields you want, enter a number from 1 to 16. Then you're asked for the name, size and type of each field. Use the cursor-up and down keys to scroll through the list of fields and make your responses. RUNbase allows up to 47 characters in a field and supports the following types:

- Text—unshifted and shifted alphanumeric characters and symbols
- Uppercase—shifted characters only
 Numeric—numerals 0-9 and . + —
- Logical—a single character only: Y(es)/N(o), T(rue)/F(alse)

As you enter each field, the program displays the total number of characters in the record so far (the maximum is 255).

Once you've entered all the fields, a prompt for a filename appears. At this point, you can abort and return to the How Many Fields prompt by pressing the up-arrow key. Enter a filename, and the database is created on the disk; then the program returns to the Main menu.

Open a Database in the Main menu



opens a previously defined RUNbase database. When you're prompted for the filename, enter it completely, without wild cards such as *. Once the database is open, its name and record count appear at the bottom of the Main menu. If a database is currently open, it is closed before the new one is opened.

Close Database closes the current database and updates the index file (see Index Database and Search below) on the disk.

Edit Database enables you to add to or alter an open database. The Edit submenu provides the following choices: Edit Record, Add Record, Next Record, Previous Record, Goto Record, Goto Top, Goto Bottom, Search, Toggle Delete and Exit. Most of these are self-explanatory, but a few need some comment

First of all, when using Edit Record and Add Record, you use the cursor keys to scroll through the fields. But if you scroll up past the top field, the operation aborts. The delete and insert keys function normally.

Second, the Toggle Delete option marks and unmarks a record for deletion. A deleted record won't appear in reports (see Print Reports below), but it isn't removed from the database unless you use the Main menu Pack option (below).

Finally, the Search option uses the index fields (see Index Database below) to search through an indexed database. If you don't have an index set up, Search is inoperative.

View Database in the Main menu opens a submenu with three options: View Records, Statistics and Exit. View ►

RUN it right: C-128 (in 80-Column mode); printer optional

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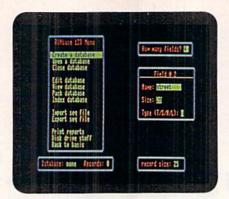

Records lets you step through your records, one at a time. Statistics displays a description of each field, the number of records in the database, and the names of the index fields.

Pack Database in the Main menu removes all records from the database that have been marked for deletion and "packs" the remaining records together to fill the gaps. For large databases, this process may require several minutes.

Index Database sets the index fields. For viewing purposes, the database is sorted alphanumerically by these fields, but with lowercase *preceding* uppercase. Two fields—primary and secondary—can be active at one time, but, due to space limitations, only 20 characters are significant for sorting purposes, the first 15 in the primary field and five in the secondary. However, this should be adequate for most databases.

Import SEQ File reads a non-RUNbase sequential file from disk and adds it to the current database, one field at a time. Fields in the sequential file must be separated by a carriage return, and empty fields must consist of a single space followed by a return. After using



Menu-driven RUNbase makes using a database easier than ever.

Import, you must re-index to update the index file.

Export SEQ File is the reverse of Import. It writes the current RUNbase database to disk as a sequential file, with fields separated by a carriage return.

Print Reports displays a submenu with Report, Dump and Exit options.

The Report option generates customized reports of the database contents. When you select this, the program asks for the page width—the width of the

printed part of the report—and the left margin. The total report width is the page width plus the left margin. Then it asks for a report title, which is printed at the top of each page. Next it presents a list of all the fields in the database. Select the ones you want to print, and they are added to the list on the screen. If there isn't enough room on the page for a field, selecting it won't work. Choose Done to start printing the report.

The Dump option lists all the fields for each record to the screen or printer, regardless of the total report width.

The **Disk Drive Stuff** submenu offers Directory, Change Drive and Exit options.

Back to Basic stops RUNbase and returns you to the Basic operating system. If the current database has been modified, the file is updated before the program quits.

That's all there is to it. Short and sweet. . . and handy! R

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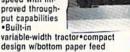


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Money Manager

This personal finance program does everything but make the money, write the checks and pay the bills.



By REX DAY

oney Manager contains many advanced options that are not normally found in programs of this type. It maintains and balances a checkbook, records payments by category and generates reports summarizing month-to-date, year-to-date and average monthly payments.

The EZ Budget part of the program provides a simple but effective way to prepare monthly and yearly financial plans by comparing estimated expenses with anticipated income and then making adjustments. Later it compares actual income and expenses with the budget. Money Manager is easy to use, with menus and on-screen prompts, as well as Help messages that are available throughout.

CATEGORY CODES

The first time you run Money Manager, follow the prompts to select up to 38 category codes for your checkbook payments and budgets. I've supplied

codes that you can use or replace with your own (see Table 1). They are easy to remember, since each one consists of the first three letters of the category it designates.

The program accepts codes up to four characters long, so you can add characters to mine to further identify categories or to identify tax-deductible payments. Codes you may not need can just remain, and you can later replace them with others by using the new code in a transaction and by following the on-screen prompts for replacing unused codes. You don't have to worry—the program does not print any unused codes in reports.

You can edit codes when you're first setting up the program and at the beginning of a year, but once you start entering transactions, all you can do is replace unused codes with new ones. The four xxx blanks are supplied specifically for this purpose.

PROGRAM OPTIONS

After you've established the category codes, the main menu appears, offering seven options: Add Transactions, View/ Change Transactions, Print Check Register, Payment Analysis, EZ Budget, New Month and Quit.

Select the Add Transactions option to enter your checkbook activities, doing so in the order that they appear in your checkbook. As you enter each transaction, your new balance appears on the screen, and data is accumulated in preparation for monthly and yearto-date reports.

A minimal number of keyboard entries are needed for each checkbook transaction, since Money Manager automatically repeats the date until you actually change it, and it enters the month and year in new dates. It also skips the Deposit field when a payment is entered, and check numbers are incremented by one, so you don't have to enter the check number unless it's out of consecutive order.

You can review and make changes in transactions quickly by pressing the P key for the previous transaction or the N key for the next, or you can do it through the View/Change Transaction option in the main menu.

Money Manager makes it easy to split one check payment among two or more categories. Whenever you have such a case, just enter the amount to be charged to the first code and then type S, for split, at the Help prompt. The check number, date and description are automatically placed in the next transaction, so that you have to enter only the amount for the category code.

You'll find this option particularly useful when you write checks for cash. You should be sure to keep either receipts or memos about your cash expenditures; then, at the end of the month, enter the total as a negative payment in the cash category, using a description such as "distribution of cash" and blanking out the check number. Then enter the amount for each

category code, using the split-check technique.

The Print Check Register and Payment Analysis options print a list of checkbook transactions for the month to date. They will also print out a report listing your month-to-date, year-to-date and average monthly payments according to category.

For a complete listing of a month's activity, select the Check Register and Payment Analysis options after the last checkbook transaction has been entered for the month.

The New Month option is handy for switching months without restarting the program. Transactions are stored on disk by month, so an earlier month's activity can be recalled quickly for viewing or printing reports. Any correction to an earlier file must also be entered as a transaction in the current month, so your checkbook balance and year-todate totals are properly updated.

EZ BUDGET

The menu for the budget portion of Money Manager offers you six options: Prepare Budget, Revise Budget, Budget Analysis, New Month, Return to Main Menu and Quit. With the Prepare Budget option, you can establish budgets for as many months of the year as you wish, and then later update them using Revise Budget.

When you select any one of these options, the category codes you have in Money Manager will be listed on the screen, along with instructions that will enable you to enter or change the budgeted amounts.

You must also enter your estimated income (anticipated deposits to your checking account) for the month, to be compared to your estimated expenses. If the results of the comparison don't please you, you can make budget changes and immediately see the effects.

Change the budget as much as you want until it's balanced and best meets your financial needs. If you go on to prepare a budget for another month, you can start from the one you've already created, so you have to enter only the amounts that differ.

The Budget Analysis option prepares monthly and year-to-date reports that compare your actual income and expenditures to your budget.

These reports will help you detect adverse spending trends and provide information for future financial planning and budget revision. R

Now you can add point-and-click control to your C-128 programs. By MARK JORDAN

BERKELEY SOFTWORKS, WITH GEOS, was the first to implement the desktop metaphor for the C-64/128 family. The key hardware component that made this possible was the mouse, which let you move in an immediate one-to-one relationship with the screen.

Unfortunately, with the exception of GEOS, RUN Paint and Basic 8, little software for Commodore computers has come along that makes use of the point-and-click phenomenon. That's a great pity because, with the C-128's excellent Basic and the VIC chip's admirable sprite power, buttons are easy to do. And what are buttons? They're simply predefined areas of the screen that are point-and-clickable. Sometimes

they're visible; sometimes they're not.

The little 40-column program in Listing 1 shows how easily buttons can be added to any C-128 program. As it stands, the program merely demonstrates the buttons concept within the C-128 sphere. But with a little study of its principles, you can get started buttoning up your own programs, large and small

In general, the program works as follows. Sprite 1 is defined as the pointer sprite, matching the interrupt mouse driver that comes with the 1351 mouse. (Be sure you have that driver on the disk that's in the drive when you run this program.) Sprites 2-7 are the movable buttons. Sprite 8 is the home button.

The program first lets you place the buttons wherever they feel right, an important design concept in the desktop metaphor. With that done, you can point to any button and get it to execute. In this program, that means the computer tells you which button you pressed—no big deal until you put it to work (the remarks in the listing tell how). The home button just takes you back to the beginning.

Obviously, the primary purpose of this program is to press some buttons in your creative mind.

GOLD MINE

Grab every capsule in Arkanoid; make your caveman yell at your opponent in Caveman Ugh-Lympics; plus other tips to improve your gaming skills.

FOR ALMOST TWO YEARS, Gold Mine's gaming tips have been one of the most popular features in *Commodore Magazine*. Now that it's joined *RUN*, even more readers can gather nuggets from the Mine.

For those new to the column, Gold Mine has tips on game play for the C-64 and C-128, submitted by readers from around the world. It emphasizes tips from recent bestselling games without overlooking past favorites.

While we try to ensure that all of the tips will work as published, you should be advised that some tips work only on certain 64 or 128 configurations.

4×4 OFF-ROAD RACING: The best truck for long-distance races is the Katana with the spare fuel tank. Hitting the large boulders right before a river or mud bog will fling you across without any loss of speed.

ARCADE GAME CONSTRUCTION KIT: When drawing black characters, it helps to draw them first in something bright, then to change it to black when the character is finished.

ARKANOID: Other than the "D" capsule, you should grab every capsule that appears on the screen. Each one contributes significantly toward an extra life.

But watch out if the "D" capsule appears. Because it accelerates the ball segments formed, you're likely to lose all three very quickly. Grab "D" only if the ball is moving very slowly, or if you have room to handle the extra speed.

If you do get the "D" capsule, no new bonus capsules will appear until two of the ball segments are lost. Because each capsule is worth 1,000 points, you might want to let two ball segments escape immediately.

-BRUCE D. ROSE ADDRESS UNKNOWN BARD'S TALE III: Instead of wasting valuable spellpoints in healing your party, press P for party. Everyone but your Bard will defend. The Bard will play "Bringaround Ballad." The next time, do the same thing, but have everyone in your party defend. Keep it up until everyone is healed.

If you can't figure out what an item is, pass it around to other players in your party. Try to see which players can equip it.

BUBBLE BOBBLE: Use the ice cream cones on your enemies, and they'll turn into 10,000-point diamonds.

On levels 1 and 6, blow as many bubbles as you can before killing the last opponent. You'll end up with lots of fruit.

The red lamp gives you points for moving and jumping, and the yellow lamp gives you more firing power. The blue cross turns your enemies into diamonds, while the brown cross lets you breathe fire.

CAVEMAN UGH-LYMPICS: In the clubbing event, you can make your caveman yell at your opponent. Just press the joystick button (as if you were going to play the look-at-the-birdie trick) when the meteor falls at the lower left of the screen. When the caveman yells, you get to see your opponent go flying.

CURSE OF THE AZURE BONDS: An ideal party consists of two fighters, a paladin, a cleric, a magic-user and either a thief or a fighter/thief.

When you first start out, make sure you follow the hints on the reference card. If you spend your money carefully, you should be able to afford platemail armor for a few of your characters. Remember not to visit Filani the Sage before you have bought everything you need. She takes half your gold as payment for her services.

When you attack the king's carriage, surrender at the first opportunity. You'll avoid unnecessary battles.

Once you've found the treasure room in the thieves' guild (don't enter the sewers until you've found it), rest and memorize spells. If you find armor that you think may be magic, try it on and watch your armor class. If it goes down, then you either have better armor or magical armor.

When travelling to and from the standing stones, go by the wilderness routes. Fire Knives and Red Plumes patrol the roads.

In the village of Hap, kill some of the dark elf patrols. Take their weapons and armor. Dark elf chain mail is equal to plate mail +1, and dark elf long swords do more damage than regular swords.

It's also necessary to kill some dark elf patrols to reduce the number of elves in the barn. The more patrols you eliminate, the better your chances of defeating the Efreet.

When you are going down in Dracandro's tower, there is a dark elf lord who is very hard to defeat. Cast spells like Haste, Bless and Prayer to have a chance of killing him. On the second level down, there is a similar elf who demands gold and magical items. He is only an illusion. If you attack him, he vanishes.

Search when you are near Daggerfalls, and find a magic shop that sells magic items and spells. There is another shop in Zhentil Keep.

OPERATION WOLF: To complete all six mission objectives, you must keep your injury level relatively low. To do this, always leave one man alive at every level, but destroy all helicopters, armored vehicles, and so on. ▶

While he shoots you periodically, pick up supplies. Keep picking up supplies until you have six magazines and eight grenades, with your health relatively low. This doesn't always work, but when it does, you can complete the whole game and see the final screen!

POOL OF RADIANCE: To the east of the Kobold Cave is a forest in the middle of a swamp. Go into the castle there and find a passage underground. There's an anti-magic zone there, but you can rest as long as you want to after a battle.

Search all of the pools to find some shields +2. When you go to Yarash's pyramid, you can rest almost anywhere near an exit or wherever the path goes diagonally. Look for some thieves; they have magic wands.

After defeating Yarash, find a switch on the wall in the room; change it to copper. Find a teleport and go into it. Search the room you appear in, and you'll find some magic items. Go back in the teleport and change the switch to blue. Go out the teleport, and you should be near an exit.

When you go to rescue the heir of Bivant, first find someone there who will sell you a pass to see the captain. Show the pass to the guards. If you fight the captain, you will get magic shields and a plate mail +3. Kill the captain before rescuing the prisoners.

ROBOCOP: To get past level one, try to get to the last house as quickly as possible. Kill just a few thugs along the way, so you can acquire the three-way bullets just before reaching the last house. You will also need armor bullets for your three-way bullets.

The last house will have two windows with three thugs. You must shoot the three thugs in one shot, killing all. Proceed a few steps to the right of the building, and three more thugs will appear in the windows. Kill them the same way. Do this several times and no more thugs will appear. Keep walking to the right and proceed to the next level.

Do the same in level three, but shoot more thugs along the way.

When driving an automatic, you can save time and points by quickly pulling back on the joystick, then releasing it when the rpm needle is at 5500. The computer waits until below 5000 rpm to change.

In Standard mode, it is safe to downshift at about 5500 rpm.

COMMODORE CLINIC

Lou leaves; Ellen rules. Commodore Clinic's new columnist tackles readers' technical questions.

By ELLEN RULE

My Sears SR-2000 printer connects directly to the disk drive with a Commodore serial cable, and the parallel cable connector and switch make it Epson-compatible. Would I benefit from using the Epson-compatible mode? And how do I use the parallel connector?

-AL SWEENEY CHICAGO, IL

Many new printer owners start out using Commodore Emulation mode, since it's the easiest way to begin using your printer's options. As you gain confidence with your computing ability, you may want more control over your printer options, and you may wish to access the higher-resolution capabilities of the Epson mode (especially desirable for GEOS users).

In order for your Commodore computer to communicate with the Epsoncompatible side of your printer, you need a Commodore-to-parallel printer interface (available from your local computer dealer or through the mail order houses that are advertised in this

magazine).

I use Xetec's Super Graphix interface with my parallel printer, and I know that many Commodore users are quite satisfied with the MW-350 interface from MicroWorld. The switches on these units give you control over carriage-return and line-feed options, device number, and so on. An important setting is the 1525-emulate/transparent option, which lets you match the interface to your software's output. Once installed, the interface is "invisible" to the user; in other words, forget it's there until you need to control the options.

I need a short machine language routine that locks the top line of the screen in place. I'd like to print anything on the top line, and it shouldn't flicker when the screen is scrolling.

A I talked with QuantumLink's QTutor BRO, the head of Quan-

tum Community College Computer Science Department, who confirmed that in order to accomplish this programming task, you need to utilize interrupt-driven routines. Jim Butterfield's Machine Language for the Commodore 64, 128 and Other Commodore Computers (published by Prentice-Hall) discusses interrupts in Chapter 7 and provides a sample exercise that displays text on the top line of the screen. You should be able to build on this exercise to create the code you describe.

If you need help with the material in Butterfield's book, the QuantumLink Community College uses the book in their machine language courses. You can check on-line in the QCC General Information Area or in the QCC Course Catalog for more details about this and

other on-line courses.

I own a 1350 mouse and the second (right) button does not work. What should I do? Also, I need a place to put my machine language programs in conjunction with Basic. When I look in the memory maps, it seems that all the memory is taken up except bit-map, which I need for graphics, and an "application program" area, which is too small (\$1300-\$1BFF).

You're not alone in being unable to use the right-hand mouse button, since, according to an article on page 39 of the Twin Cities 128 Compendium Book #1, only the circuitry in the left button of the 1350 mouse is properly connected. The article, "Mouse Modifications" by Avonelle Lovhaug, describes how a qualified technician can install an inexpensive resistor in the mouse to activate the right button. A brief coding routine is included to demonstrate how to read it. The Compendium is a collection of articles from issues 1-18 of Twin Cities 128-The Commodore 128 Journal (PO Box 11578, Minneapolis, MN 55411).

As for your machine language problem, I can't tell you everything you need to know in the space available here, but there are several books that describe the idiosyncracies of using machine language on the 128. Most ML programmers I know seem proficient at tucking bits of code here and there in the 128's memory. SAM's Commodore 128 Assembly Language Programming, by Mark Andrews, describes several locations in RAM that, depending on your program's requirements, may be free for your use.

For example, in bank 0, the Basic and Kernal working storage is allocated from \$0B00 to \$1BFF. Included in this range are the Datassette buffer (\$0B00-\$0BFF), the 512-byte RS-232 serial buffer (\$0C00-\$0DFF), and the sprite definition area (\$0E00-\$0FFF), as well as the 2K segment (\$1300-\$1BFF) you mentioned. Try splitting up your code and putting it into areas not used by

your program.

Other locations may also be utilized, such as the C-128's 40-column text display area (\$0400-\$07FF), which can be used for color-control information when the 128 is in High Resolution mode. Also, once you know how much room your Basic code and variable storage will consume, you can relocate the top of Basic to gain even more space. Bank switching between the 128's different memory configurations is yet another technique used by programmers to manipulate the 128's memory. Try experimenting with a combination of these techniques to find what works best for you.

I typed in your Checksum program from the November issue. When I try to run the program, the computer informs me that I have an Out of Data error in line 30. I proofed line 30 from the listing several times, and there are no errors in typing on my part. What could be the problem?

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structions that read in the data, so that when it reaches an error in a Data statement when you run the program, you get the error response.

RUN's Associate Editor, Harold "Buzz" Bjornsen managed to convince former Technical Manager Lou Wallace to modify the Checksum program to take care of this problem. See page 51 for the new version-which will appear in every issue-and documentation explaining its use.

How many ways can the C-128 be modified? Also, I understand early models had a few bugs. What are they and how can I tell if my machine is an early model?

Roy Lee, of Memory Management, Inc., a Commodore-authorized repair center in Wellesley, Massachusetts, told me only one upgrade to the C-128 originated at Commodore. The three-chip ROM upgrade, available for

about \$25 plus installation charges, corrected problems in the C-128 operating system. These bugs included round-off errors in the internal math package, a problem with negative-value relative coordinates on Basic 7.0 bit-mapped graphics commands, and the Q key, which printed only a lowercase q in Caps Lock mode.

Except for the Q-key problem, the bugs would not be noticeable to the nonprogrammer. So, if you press the Q key in Caps Lock mode that results in a lowercase q on the screen, then you probably own an early model of the C-128. Here's a one-line program that will fix the problem. Just enter it and run the program:

10 FAST:BANK15:FORJ = 0 TO 88:POKE6333 + J,PEEK(64484 + J): NEXT:POKE840,189:POKE841,24: POKE6395,209:SLOW

The popular 64K video display controller (VDC) RAM upgrade did not originate at Commodore, although it is built into Commodore's C-128D. The VDC upgrade increases display memory, enabling true multicolor graphics on the 80-column screen. It may also be used by RAM-disk utility programs designed to access this memory.

Third-party chips made for the 128's empty ROM socket include Basic 8 and 128 SuperChip, which—when installed by a qualified technician-provide instant access to the programs they contain when the control key is depressed at startup.

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RUN'S CHECKSUM & PROGRAM TYPING HINTS

TYPE IN RUN'S CHECKSUM, which serves for both the C-64 and for the C-128 in either 40- or 80-Column mode, and save it to disk before running it. When typing in a program from RUN, first load and run RUN's latest version of the Checksum program, which contains a new feature explained below. The screen will display a SYS number (49152 for the C-64; 3328 for the C-128) that deactivates and reactivates the Checksum. Always disable RUN's Checksum before attempting to run another program. Note: You can abbreviate Basic keywords; spaces affect the checksum only when within quotes; and the order of characters affects the checksum.

When you press return after typing in a program line, a one-, two-, or three-digit number from 0 to 255 appears in the home position. If this number matches the checksum value in the program listing, the line as you typed it is correct. If the number that appears doesn't match the checksum value, compare the line with the magazine listing to find your error. Then move the cursor back up to the line and make your corrections. Now, after you press return, the correct checksum value should appear. Continue entering the listing until all the lines have been correctly typed. Then deactivate RUN's Checksum, using the appropriate SYS number, and save the finished program.

We sometimes get letters and phone calls from new readers who have typed in the Checksum program for the first time. They are confused by the "Out of Data Error in Line 30" message that appears when they try to run the Checksum program. Understandably, they compare line 30 of the listing with line 30 as they typed it in, and cannot find anything wrong. The message unintentionally misleads them into thinking the error is in line 30, whereas the typing mistake is actually somewhere in one of the Data statements in lines 190–350.

So, we've added a new feature to the Checksum program that alerts readers to the number of the Data statement line in the Checksum program where an error has actually been made. Note that this feature works only on the Checksum program itself, and not on any other program listing in RUN.

After you've entered and saved the Checksum program to disk, run it. If you've made any errors in any of the Data statements, the program will give you a specific line number. Find the mistake, correct it, press return, save the program and run it again. Repeat this procedure until the Checksum program runs flawlessly.

CONTROL CHARACTERS DEMYSTIFIED

All the graphics and control characters in the listings in RUN have been translated into understandable key combinations. They are the instructions you see inside the curly braces. For example, {SHIFT L} means you hold down the shift key while you press the L key once. You do not type in the curly braces. What appears on the screen will look quite different from what is designated inside the braces. Here are some more examples:

{22 SPACES}—press the space bar 22 times. {SHIFT CLR}—hold down the shift key and press the clr-home key once.

{2 CRSR DNs}—press the cursor-down key twice.

[CTRL 1]—hold down the control key and press the 1 key.

{COMD T}—hold down the Commodore logo key and press the T key.

{5 LB.s}-press the British pound key (£, not #) five times.

Refer to the following paragraphs for any other Error messages you get from running any program listing in RUN.

OTHER ERROR MESSAGES

Having heard from many users over the years about their difficulties with typing in listings, we've identified a few recurring problems that plague many people but are easy to fix. So read on and see if your problem is one of these.

 You get an "Out of Data in Line xxx" message. This means that a program line was reading from Data statements and reached the end of the data before it was done reading. There are two possible problems.

One might be with the program line that reads the data, usually a For-Next loop. Make sure you have the proper values for the loop, because if, for example, the listing has a loop of 0 to 150, and you've typed 0 to 160, you'll get the Out of Data message. If the loop is correct, then the problem lies in the Data statements themselves. One possibility is that you omitted a whole line of data. That's easy enough to find and correct. It's more likely that you've skipped one or more individual data items or typed in a period instead of a comma, which causes two data values to be read as one number. Check your typing carefully against the listing. Using RUN's Checksum program when you type in listings from the magazine should help in this case.

• You get an "Illegal Quantity Error in Line xxx" message. This means you've read a number from a Data statement and tried to poke it into a memory address. The error occurs because the number is larger than 255 (the largest value a memory address can contain), which means that somewhere in your Data statements you've made an error by typing in a number larger than 255. Again, this is easy to check for and correct. First look in your Data statements for a number larger than 255. You might have added an extra digit, or perhaps you ran two numbers together (23456 instead of 234,56).

 You get a "Syntax Error in Line xxx" message. This could be almost anything. What it tells you is that there is something wrong in the indicated line. Usually you've misspelled a Basic keyword or omitted some required character. List the line and examine it carefully.

 You get an "Error in Data" message. This occurs in programs that add up all the data as read, and, when finished, compares that sum with what it should be if the data were typed in correctly. If it isn't the same, it means an error somewhere in typing the Data statements. Go back and check the data carefully. Correct the mistake(s), save the new version and try again.

 Finally, we urge everyone who intends to type in one of our listings to use RUN's Checksum program, which will help you avoid every mistake we've mentioned above, except that it won't detect the omission of a line. R
